## WAS on "The Magic Band" Anyone Can Do It

I never started seriously collecting Grid Squares on the 6-meter band until mid-1997. One needs a fresh pursuit when your "want list" for new entities on the HF bands dwindles to a mere handful. So looking for a new grid to work on 50 MHz suddenly became an almost-daily obsession. And I figured that working Hawaii and Alaska on "The Magic Band" some day would be a miracle in itself, what with my modest 100 watts and 7-element Yagi.

But this past fall, the band came alive like never before, and there was suddenly an abundance of DX to be worked — at least for the northeast US. Cycle 23 was being very good to us with generous morning openings to Europe almost daily. On November 10<sup>th</sup>, the band opened to the far northwest and I snared my first of eight Alaskan grids. Five weeks later, a portable KH6 unexpectedly surfaced, with rare ideal propagation to east coast USA, and, like many other lucky ones in this area, I easily had the Aloha state in the log. With that, it was time to determine what I lacked for WAS.

Turns out I had never worked West Virginia — or so I thought. Commenced a diligent search through numerous old VHF contest logs from back in the days when I used to borrow a 6-meter rig for the January effort. Found a contest station callsign whose grid partially extended into WV, dropped the Trustee an e-mail, and was informed they always operated from a mountaintop site called Spruce Knob, WV. Made my day. Had their QSL in my SASE for #50 within a week. Local Field Checker K2MP ably processed the submission to the ARRL, and 50 MHz (all SSB) WAS Certificate #1142 was issued March 8, 2002.

If you have yet to try "The Magic Band", I urge you to give it some serious thought. A lot of fun and fresh challenges await you. And with 32,400 Grid Squares on the globe, you'll never run out of new ones to chase. Enjoy!

## "Come On Down!"

The Rochester DX Association invites one and all to participate with us in our 2002 Field Day operation. Whether you are a newcomer, old-timer, VHF operator, or unlicensed and just interested in Ham Radio, at this year's Field Day event we have a station for you to operate. With the help of an RDXA member and experienced HF operator, we'll get you on the air and making contacts.

As stipulated by the ARRL, this year's Field Day emergency preparedness exercise will feature a "Get on the Air" (GOTA) station. The goal of the GOTA station is to provide the opportunity for as many people as possible to operate an amateur station and make contacts with other Field Day participants. Additionally, this year's rules have expanded Field Day to include ALL of the Americas. For the first time, long-haul DX contacts will be an integral part of the event.

The RDXA Field Day site is in Webster Park campground just South of Lake Ontario. Field Day runs for 24 hours beginning Saturday, 22 June at 1400 local time (2:00 PM). Webster Park Campground is located on the South side of Lake Road, West of the intersection of Holt Road and Lake Road. Head East on 104 and cross the Bay Bridge. Take Holt Road North from Route 104 to its end at Lake Road; turn left on Lake Road. Go West 0.6 mile and then turn South (left) off of Lake into Webster Park Campground. Drive past the camping area (on the left), where the road will change from paved to gravel. Continue straight 0.1 mile to the next open field and there you will find the RDXA Field Day operation in full swing.

Experience the thrill and excitement of HF operating in the annual ARRL Field Day emergency preparedness exercise. Make contacts across the country and around the world. Join the friendly and experienced hams of RDXA--first place winners in the 2001 Field Day event--and "Get on the Air" in Field Day 2002!

## Simple Things Every Club Member Can Do to Promote Amateur Radio.

"Ham Radio, The World's Best Kept Secret!"  
"Like the Man Who's Found Religion, We've Got to Spread the Word About Ham Radio."  
"RARA Is Focused on the Members: Recruitment, Development and Retention."  
"Communicate Enthusiasm!" Below are a few ways that you can do this. Look them over and practice those that you can.

### At home, work, school, other clubs:

Hang your QSL card, or a picture of your rig, or both, on your office wall.

Have your call sign in EVERY e-mail signature block you send out, personal or business; be proud that you are a ham.

Have a world or country map hanging on your office wall. When someone takes an interest in the map, or goes on vacation, mention that you've talked to hams that live there. "It's 1 o'clock here and the hams in Europe are sitting down to dinner about now."

All of your friends, relatives and classmates/co-workers should know that you are an amateur radio operator, especially in the technology or engineering fields. They may have always been interested in ham radio but did not know someone to show them how to get involved.

When you're scheduled to work a public service event, tell your friends and co-workers that your ham radio club is providing volunteer communications. You might get people interested, or maybe, just more public service events.

When asked about Amateur Radio, enthusiastically discuss some of your recent or current ham radio experiences. This could help reactivate an inactive ham or spark an interest in others. Besides, enthusiasm spreads.

Let your employer know that you are a licensed amateur operator and that you and an entire body of other amateurs are available for

health and welfare type messaging during communications emergencies.

On a nearby bulletin board, post ham articles about local school contacts with the ISS, or other general interest ham info, Hamfest or license class announcements.

On your personal web page mention that you are a ham radio operator and provide a link to RARA.

If you routinely write your name in your books, add your callsign, too.

### At the Doctor's/Dentist's Office:

As mentioned elsewhere in the *RARA RAG*, recycle your old QST-CQ-73 Magazines at waiting rooms, barbershop, dentist, etc. with a label similar to the following (available from Dick Goslee):

### On the Street: My Name is Joe, and, I'm a Ham:

Don't hide your HT -- make your call visible on the rig or hand mike. When people ask you what you are doing explain that it is ham radio, it's not hard, it's not expensive, it's a lot of fun and it's useful.

When in a consumer electronics store, always mention that you're a ham. Everyone, including prospective hams, overhear the discussions.

Leave your QSL card or drop off a *RARA RAG* or club contact sheet at your nearest Radio Shack.

Start up a conversation, put your QSL or business card with your call under the wipers of an unknown ham-license-plated vehicle, to remind them of just how friendly hams really are.

If you don't have ham vanity plates on your car, get a ham-related bumper or window sticker.

Wear some visible article of clothing with your

radio club patch or callsign printed on it.

### On the Air: Use Extreme Courtesy:

Many people are listening including prospective hams and EVERY newspaper-radio-TV newsroom has VHF/UHF scanners.

Congratulate people publicly over the air. Make a good little fuss over someone's new license or upgrade or first ever country/xyz contact. Let them feel good about it. People join clubs because of activities; they stay because of fellowship.

Learn a simple greeting-word or phrase in several languages, to use during QSOs with foreign speakers. Just about all the DX operators learned enough QSO-English to get by, so give them a nod of respect in their native language.

On SSB or CW in every language, every DX ham understands "BEST TO UR FAMILY"

Send your QSL card to all SWL requests — ALWAYS. They are part of the next generation of radio enthusiasts. Make sure to encourage them in their radio endeavors in a personal note on your card.

Over the air, mention that last SWL QSL request you received, especially to DX stations from that same country. Send the SWL a local-interest postcard. Let your actions show that you are completely serious about inviting SWLs to become amateur radio operators.

The back of every one of your outbound QSL cards should have your handwritten note: "Thanks for the contact, hope to work u agn — 73"

All of these little things work. Be apart of making amateur radio continue to be great and a growing fraternity.

The motivation to become licensed as a ham was to obtain a Technician license enabling me to fly radio controlled model airplanes on 6 meters. My ham experience started with a novice course taught by Ed Holdsworth in the county office building used before 111 Westfall Rd.
