
## From The President of RARRA



# Travel Fun With Your HT

The day finally arrived. W2JAT (Jack), N2TOC (Tom) and myself AA2LQ (Warren) along with the XYL's boarded AMTRAK for 19 days of train, bus and ship travel. Each of us, armed with our Yaesu VX5's, could not have anticipated the amount and variety of contacts we would make as we journeyed westward. The first leg of our trip was from Rochester with an overnight stay in Toronto and then on to Vancouver, BC with several day stops in Jasper, Banff and Lake Louise. We decided to communicate among ourselves on the train using FRS (Family Radio) frequencies so we would not have to constantly identify by call sign. With expanded receive/transmit, the VX5 did a great job with FRS.

Prior to our trip, W2JAT prepared a listing of all the repeater and Internet Radio Linking Project (IRLP) nodes within 10 miles of the path we would follow. Our first overnight stop was Toronto. From my hotel room at the Royal York I set my HT to the IRLP frequency of the local node, keyed in 4250 and was immediately connected to WR2ROC. From there on it was as if I was in Rochester on the 443.600 repeater. A call for "anyone on frequency" immediately got a response from a KC2 in Rochester and I had made my first IRLP contact home while many miles away.

Traveling west via rail, many VE contacts were made by W2JAT and N2TOC. The Canadian hams were great to talk to and they offered us many tips on repeaters ahead of us.

Other interesting IRLP contacts home while traveling on the first leg of our trip included one made from a node in Edmonton, Alberta to K2AS (Brian) and another from a node in the Canadian Rockies to N2HKD (Curtis). Amazing, because it was about midnight Rochester time for Curtis. When arriving in Vancouver, W2JAT had a nice QSO with Logan (VE7TLH) at IRLP node 100 (VE7RHS). This is the home of IRLP and although Logan was not the trustee of the node, he was taking care of it while the system people were out of town. Logan proved to be extremely helpful by describing the node and providing information on what we would encounter on the next leg of our trip.

The second leg of our trip was a cruise to

Alaska (Round trip from Vancouver) on the inland waterway. The ship rented FRS radios to passengers resulting in those frequencies being quite busy. Therefore, we switched to 446.100 simplex to communicate among ourselves. On a ship with over 2000 passengers, the ability to talk and locate each other was a major benefit.

While cruising to Alaska we contacted many local hams and had many very interesting QSO's. There are a few IRLP nodes in Alaska; however, we found them to be off the air while we were there. As we cruised back into Vancouver harbor, we again tried node 100. Within a very short period of time we had solid voice connections with KC2NM (Mike) and WB2SSJ (Tex), hams in Rochester we know quite well. Also, while at sea, W2JAT Jack contacted AB2MO (Brad) in Rochester.

The last leg of our trip was via bus from Vancouver to Seattle and then a very shaky ride on AMTRAK back to Rochester. Yes, the AMTRAK tracks are not as smooth as the ones in Canada. During this portion of the trip, we enjoyed making contacts along the route.

If you are not familiar with IRLP, visit <http://www.irlp.net> and become familiar with how you can communicate home with just a HT while traveling thousands of miles away. The FLARES website, <http://www.flares.monroe.edu>, will give you information regarding W2COP's (Jim) local WR2ROC repeater/IRLP node on 443.6. There are nodes in many countries and more are being added almost daily. If you get a chance, give IRLP a try.

## RARA RAG 20 Years Ago, June 1982

The June meeting then, as now, is the picnic with the venue at Powder Mill Park's Wadhams Lodge with John Golden, W2IRG, as picnic chairman. There was much news on the successful 1982 Hamfest with an attendance topping 5,000. The WX was perfect and 18 commercial ham vendors in the Dome arena made that area standing room only. Stan Zack, K2PSO, Hudson Division Director, was named ham of the year. The following officers were elected: President is Ed Holdsworth, N2EH; VP to Bill Thiel, K2KGE; Secretary is Al Goss, K2SPO; and Gil Chapin, WB2UTI as Treasurer. To the Board of Directors were W2EBF, AF2K, K2RJ, AC2K, KD2K, K2NC and K2HC. A large portion of this issue was devoted to news on the proposed NYS Bill to eliminate Sales Tax on Amateur Radio Equipment. A complete listing of area legislators was provided to enable a letter writing campaign in support of passage. (It did not pass — Ed) Printed was the result of the annual audit of RARA's financial records, with not only no issues found, but also ending with compliments to those in charge of the records. Public service activities were numerous this year including STPR road Rally, Scotch Bonnet Sailboat race, Mendon Pony Rally, WNY Pony Rally, Hamlin Beach Triathlon, Genesee Valley Cycling Club and Canaltown Days in Palmyra. A new advertiser was the Genesee Radio Amateurs, Inc., with a half page ad for the new Batavia Hamfest. From the want ads you could buy a Drake 4-line station from Jim Allen, KB2KY.
