Nominated for Vice-President

James DiTucci, N2IXD

In 1959 my uncle, an Electrical Engineer at General Dynamics, handed me a metal parts cabinet full of strange looking devices. These components, manufactured by companies like General Electric, Raytheon, RCA, Sylvania, Scientific Radio Products, Cornell Dubilier, Sangamo, and others were stamped with identifiers like 2N43, CK722, 3655 KC, and .0001 MFD/5000V. In another box were dozens of electron tubes in all shapes, sizes and construction, stamped with numbers like 6Q7, 1H4 and 807. My uncle said to me, "In these boxes you will find magic. Have fun!" And that I did!

With several of those parts in hand, I spent hours in the library searching through radio and electronics books trying to match those parts to pictures. Armed with "The Boys' First Book of Radio and Electronics," by Alfred Morgan, I returned home eager to experiment. I built project after project, using and reusing those parts until the leads broke off or they fizzled in smoke.

I built several communications receivers and transmitters and my penchant for the magic of radio led me to far-away destinations. Through a newfound interest in short wave listening I developed a love of Geography and International Affairs. In later years while serving on Army active duty I had the great joy of becoming intimately familiar with the under-hood operation and maintenance of classic communication equipment like the R-390, T-195, TT-77, TT-98 and other AN/GRC series HF/VHF tactical communications systems manufactured by venerable companies such as Collins, Stromberg-Carlson, Harris and others. As an early participant in the '70s computer revolution, I was well positioned to build a career in IT sales and later in technical support that continues to this day.

Along the way my desire to experiment brought me to the RaRa Hamfest in search of the strange, unusual and hard-to-find. By the early '80s I was involved as a regular commercial Hamfest Exhibitor and drafted as a Holdsworth Coolie. Yet, all of this took place before I ever entertained the urge to pick up a microphone. But in 1988, nearly 30-years after my uncle presented me with that box

of magic, I earned my first ticket. I upgraded to Extra Class (the hard way) in 1991.

Today I pursue my passion in the following areas: Assistant Emergency Coordinator, Monroe County ARES, President, Rochester Radio Repeater Association, ARRL Official Emergency Station (OES), ARRL EMCOMM Certification, American Red Cross Disaster Services training and RaRa Board of Directors.

In the last few years I have added new terms to my Amateur Radio vocabulary: APRS, SKYWARN, ARRL DXCC, National Traffic System, Winlink-2000, Wi-Fi, Project METEOR, PSK-31, AMSAT, EMCOMM, ARISS, Wireless Literacy, ARES/RACES, VoIP. Above all, I have never lost my passion for experimenting.

When I am not involved in an Amateur Radio activity you are likely to find me at my bench meticulously crafting a Hi-Vis Comparadun or Mini Muddler, or perhaps somewhere in the Catskill Mountains perfectly presenting a #22 Micro-Midge through a well-defined current seam. Sidebands – Amateur Radio in the News

Vanity call sign fee to drop – The FCC wants to reduce the Fiscal Year 2006 regulatory fee to obtain an Amateur Radio vanity call sign to \$20.10 for the 10-year license term. The current vanity fee is \$21.90. The Commission proposed the new fee in a Notice of Proposed Rule Making (NPRM), "Assessment and Collection of Regulatory Fees for Fiscal Year 2006," in MD Docket 06-68, released March 27. If ordered as proposed, the new vanity fee would become effective in August or September. The FCC is obligated to collect nearly \$289 million in regulatory fees during FY 2006 to fund its operations. Hmmm. A savings of \$1.80 amortized over ten years translates into a savings of 18 cents a year! I can get that new transceiver.

New hams in space – The International Space Station Expedition 13 crew of Commander Pavel Vinogradov, RV3BS, and Flight Engineer Jeff Williams, KD5TVQ, lifted off from Baikonur, Kazakhstan, for their docking to the ISS. They'll take over the ISS from the Expedition 12 crew of Commander Bill McArthur, KC5ACR, and Valery Tokarev. The new crew docked at the station April 1 at 0419 Zulu, Brazil's first astronaut, Marcos Pontes, will join the Expedition 13 crew for the trip into space and will spend a week aboard the ISS conducting research under a commercial agreement between the Brazilian Space Agency and the Russian Federal Space Agency. Brazilian telecommunications authorities have granted Pontes the call sign PY0AEB for use on his space journey, and there are plans for him to conduct ARISS school contacts during his mission. Pontes will return to Earth April 8 with McArthur and Tokarev, who've been in space since last October.

Solar happenings – Solar activity is suddenly increasing. The biggest sunspots of the year are crossing the solar disk – one group is longer than 10 Earth diameters and poses a threat for solar flares. Meanwhile, astronomers are monitoring a large and delightfully complex prominence dancing along the sun's surface. DS2 BPL demonstration – A demonstration at ARRL Headquarters of DS2 BPL equipment suggests the chipset developer and manufacturer is working to minimize, if not altogether eliminate, interference from its products on amateur bands, ARRL Laboratory Manager Ed Hare, W1RFI, says. Hare met with two DS2 officials at ARRL to discuss the company's improved approach to Amateur Radio band notching techniques. Based upon his observations during a demonstration of DS2's latest generation G2 technology, Hare says

he's cautiously optimistic. A spectrum analyzer check of the modem's output showed the G2 modem could attain a notch depth of up to 40 dB. "While there's no certainty that all BPL products using this technology could achieve 40 dB of protection within notched spectrum, our tests show the capability to do so is there," Hare commented. "This may not prevent all interference problems, but a 10 to 15 dB improvement over the notching used by many BPL systems in place today would be a significant improvement." Hare points out that DS2 chipsets are used by BPL equipment makers Ambient, Amperion, Corinex and Mitsubishi, among others. "Our work with DS2 could help manufacturers as they address interference problems in earlier-generation equipment."

ARES activated in tornado's aftermath – Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) teams in Missouri this week assisted emergency managers in that state with damage assessment after a huge string of tornados swept through the nation's midsection March 12. Nine people were reported dead in Missouri and one in Indiana in the aftermath of the severe weather. Missouri Section Emergency Coordinator Don Moore, KM0R, told ARRL that he and three other radio amateurs deployed March 13 as a "quick-response team" to Pettis County, Missouri, just south of Sedalia along US Route 65 to support the county's emergency operations center (EOC). "There was some major wind through here," Moore told ARRL. The severe weather damaged or took down utility lines along US Route 65 and elsewhere. The Pettis County Emergency Management Agency requested the ARES call-up. Nine ARES members ultimately activated to help seven damage-assessment teams. ARES stood down later the same day. ARES handled minimal voice traffic, Moore said. While the ARES group was prepared to pass damage assessments to the EOC via WinLink 2000, that turned out not to be necessary. The ARES team did communicate with the Missouri Emergency Management Agency to demonstrate Winlink from the field, he added. Missouri appears to have been the state hardest hit by the weekend storms, which generated hail said to have been the size of softballs. Damage in the Show-Me State stretched from west to east, with houses reportedly destroyed along a 20-mile path south of St Louis.

Tornadoes also struck Kansas, where the University of Kansas canceled classes March 13 due to safety concerns. The school, located in Lawrence, reportedly suffered damage to nearly two-thirds of its buildings, but no serious injuries were reported.

Salvation Army Team Emergency Radio Network (SATERN) members were requested to deploy the SATERN Mobile Generator Trailer when the storms knocked out power in Douglas County, Kansas. In Arkansas, Section Manager David Norris, K5UZ, reports Franklin County ARES/RACES and Sebastian County RACES activated SKYWARN nets over the weekend. "Northwest Arkansas was hammered late last night with quite a bit of damage in Centerton," he told ARRL March 13. He reported several people injured and considerable property damage. Arkansas SEC J.M. Rowe, N5XFW, reported SKYWARN nets were active as the severe weather approached.

NASA honors Cronkite – NASA has honored legendary CBS TV news anchor Walter Cronkite, KB2GSD, for his coverage of the US space program. Cronkite, who has narrated two ARRL Amateur Radio videos, received the Ambassador of Exploration Award February 28. "His marathon, live coverage of the first moon landing brought the excitement and impact of the historic event into the homes of millions of Americans and observers around the world," NASA said in announcing the award. NASA is presenting the Ambassador of Exploration Award to the 38 astronauts and other key individuals who participated in the Mercury, Gemini, and Apollo space programs for realizing America's vision of space exploration from 1961 to 1972. Cronkite is the first non-astronaut and only NASA outsider to receive the award, which consists of a small, encased sample of lunar material mounted for public display. Cronkite is the best-remembered journalist for his commentary and enthusiastic coverage of the historic progression of missions from the early Mercury launches, through the ground-breaking Gemini missions, to the Apollo 11 and subsequent moon landings.
