Spring Licensing Classes

The Spring session of the Club's licensing classes will be starting a little later this year than in the past. Normally we aim to begin in February, but this time around it will be at least March before we get started. I have been working to obtain a new location for the classes, while continuing to work with RIT on what is still available there. It is undecided at this point what the exact schedule will be, but I can tell you that I expect it to consist of either 8 to 9 weekday evening sessions or 6 Saturday morning sessions.

I'd also like to take this opportunity to publicly commend and thank the volunteer instructors who continue to give their time and energy to teaching these classes. Our stable of instructors includes some of the brightest and most effective communicators I know.

Sidebands – Amateur Radio in the News

Local Ham Celebrities. RARA has had plenty of reason to be proud lately. Two of our members were in the media spotlight. Keith Freeberg, N2BEL, was a guest on 1370 Connections (1370 AM) with guest host Richard McCullough. The show aired in late December and the segment was devoted to hobbies. Keith spoke on behalf of ham radio. In January, Peter Fournia, W2SKY, ran an ARISS contact with fifth-grade students at Sherman School in Henrietta. On the other end of the QSO was Astronaut Sunita Williams, operating as NA1SS, in the International Space Station. The next day, an article appeared in the *Democrat and Chronicle* about the event, as well as a photograph that included Peter. Way to go guys!

Ham Assists Sailor in Distress. A California radio amateur played a part in an international effort to rescue a US sailor attempting to single-handedly circumnavigate the globe. Miguel "Mike" Morales, KC6CYK, of Riverside, told ARRL he was able to contact fellow radio amateurs in Chile to obtain and relay reassuring information to the family of Ken Barnes, whose 44-foot ketch Pivateer was foundering off South America. A Chilean trawler, Polar Pesca 1, rescued Barnes from his disabled vessel on January 5. Upon learning of Barnes's predicament on January 2, Morales said he contacted the sailor's fiance, Cathy Chambers. "She mentioned that the satellite telephone was dying on him over there, so their communication was 30 to 60 seconds at a time," Morales recounted. "I was lucky enough, I got in touch with some of the Charlie Echo [CE-prefix] stations until I got to someone in Punta Arenas, and then Polar Pesca, the vessel that did the rescue." Morales speaks fluent Spanish and has visited Chile and knew "the way things operate down there." As a result, he says, he was able to obtain credible reports via his 10-meter contacts as to what was happening. Morales said he was able to gather information via his Chilean ham radio contacts from the Polar Pesca 1. He relayed information about Barnes's location and when he was going to be rescued. Morales said he felt it was

important for the family to know Barnes's situation and how the rescue plans were playing out. Barnes, who's 47, left Long Beach, California, late last October, hoping to be the first person to sail around the world from the West Coast. A severe storm dismantled the badly damaged vessel and soaked his supplies. The Chilean Navy dispatched one of the CP3 Orion aircraft Chile uses to patrol its 200-mile-offshore territorial claim. The plane spotted the foundering vessel, photographed it and even attempted to drop a life raft that missed its mark. The Chilean Navy coordinated the operation and recruited the Polar Pesca 1 to undertake the actual rescue, although Morales says the US Coast Guard agreed to cover the expense. At that point he was able to pass along news to the family that the trawler was en route to Barnes's location. "The main thing is, Ken Barnes is back, is alive," Morales said. "What I did was on behalf of the US ham radio community, I believe. That's what you're there for." (ARRL Newsletter)

ARES Activated for Colorado Snowstorms. A major Colorado snowstorm just after Christmas prompted Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES) teams to activate for the second time in less than 10 days along Colorado's Front Range -- the state's most populous region. The December 28 storm dumped upward of three feet of snow on and around Denver, stranding both air and highway travelers. The area was just starting to recover from a pre-Christmas blizzard that stranded holiday travelers and brought the Denver area to a near-standstill when the second snowstorm struck. Colorado Section Emergency Coordinator Ben Baker, KB0UBZ, reports that all Colorado ARES teams had stood down as of Monday, January 1. The last to terminate operations were the volunteers at the Colorado State Emergency Operations Center (EOC), who held down the fort until 3 PM on New Year's Day. (ARRL Newsletter)

AMSAT-NA to Build "Eagle" at Maryland Facility. AMSAT-NA will relocate its Satellite Integration Lab to the Hawk Institute for Space Sciences (HISS) in Pocomoke City on Maryland's Eastern Shore and construct its Eagle satellite (<http://www.amsat.org/amsat-new/eagle/>) there. A division of the Maryland Hawk Corporation, HISS is a non-profit educational organization affiliated with the University of Maryland Eastern Shore (UMES) campus. "I consider these happenings to be a serious beginning of the activities towards a real spacecraft," commented AMSAT Vice President for Engineering Bob McGwier, N4HY. The new site will replace AMSAT's former lab facility in Orlando, Florida, damaged beyond repair during Hurricane Charley in August 2004. With

the unanimous approval of its board of directors, AMSAT-NA has executed memoranda of understanding with the University of Maryland Eastern Shore and with Maryland Hawk Corporation to formalize the relationship. Per the agreements, AMSAT-NA will gain essentially no-cost access to the HISS facility in return for sharing its equipment and ideas with HISS as well as limited access to the NASA Wallops Flight Facility, which includes environmental testing, machine shop, rocket manufacturing and launch facilities. In addition, AMSAT-NA will work with UMES to identify opportunities to work together on satellite and related technology projects as well as to work with students and faculty to enhance hands-on studies and research. (ARRL Newsletter)

ARISS – Henrietta Event Results

Following is what the ARRL published about our contact with the International Space Station from a school in Henrietta. Many local hams followed the event and listened to the ISS downlink. At Sherman Elementary School in Henrietta, New York, the possibility of a human space flight to Mars has been the focus of teacher Andrea Catena's fifth grade science pupils. The youngsters expanded their knowledge of life in space when they spoke via ham radio January 8 with Suni Williams. ARISS arranged the direct VHF contact between W2SKY at the school and NA1SS. Responding to one question, Williams explained that it takes more than a day to get ready for a spacewalk from the ISS. "Part of the reason is that we breathe pure oxygen, so we don't want to get 'the bends' when we go out into space, so, we have to start 'pre-breathing' the oxygen the day before" Williams told the youngsters. "And then, to get all the tools together it takes a good four or five hours."

Williams, who joined the Expedition 14 space station crew in December, said the most exciting part of her mission so far was her first spacewalk. "Actually coming out the door and seeing the world in your face for the first time, it was absolutely exhilarating!" she recounted. Williams, 41, said she first thought about becoming a member of the NASA Astronaut Corps "later in life," after she'd become a test pilot.

Members of the Rochester Amateur Radio Association (RARA) set up the necessary Earth station equipment at the school to make the QSO possible. "We had an excellent ARISS experience at Emma Sherman Elementary School yesterday," said RARA Education Committee Chairman Pete Fournia, W2SKY, who loaned his call sign for the occasion. "The school took full advantage of this opportunity making it a very memorable experience for the entire school and a very gratifying experience for the teams that participated," he said. The youngsters squeezed 16 questions into the nearly 10-minute ISS pass. The ham radio event attracted generous media attention from newspapers and television stations.


