Hi Jim and season's greetings to you and yours at R.A.R.A. I have been cleaning out the shack and found the log book I kept while studying with Harris RF in University Avenue in September and October 1977. I was the project engineer for the purchase of a suite of HF SSB equipment for the Royal New Zealand Air Force and with two technicians spent seven very happy weeks in Rochester staying in an apartment block in North Goodman where one apartment had been changed into a classroom for us to learn the installation and maintenance procedures.

I had arranged for a Ham License through the US Embassy in Wellington and on day two of our stay I purchased a Heath Kit 2m rig I saw advertised in the local paper. While testing it at the vendor's home he suggested I call, "ZL2AON listening on 88". There was a short silence then a comment; "did you hear what I just heard?" Reply, "yes, but I don't believe it". I apologised and added "portable W2" to my call sign.

That was the start of seven weeks of ham radio fun and fellowship the likes of which I had never had before and probably never experience again. As our lessons finished at 16:00 each day I was on the air from that time on until the "Champagne Net" closed about midnight and became a relay point for phone calls from mobiles stuck in the traffic snarl ups caused by the snow, to the XYL's saying, "I will be home late for dinner" etc. Then there were the invitations to the Friday night meetings at one of Rochester's Ham Clubs inevitably followed by a meal at our favourite eateries Perkins Cake & Steak, (ahhh, those pancakes!!!!) from where, despite the best efforts of the waiting staff, a menu was purloined for me one night and autographed by Jerry Novick WB2QKB, Chris Johnson WB2RJL, Bill Gillette WB2KIW, his XYL Barb Gillette and Mike Wengert KOONG. During my last week in Rochester the RARA members hosted a dinner for me and presented me with a Ringo Ranger antenna which I donated to our local repeater while I was on secondment to the Australian Air Force in 1979/80 and sad to say was irreparably damaged during a storm.

After 30 years the wonderful memories still remain and my photos of 2 metre long icicles hanging from the eaves of the house across from me still cause questions of "are they real?" when I show them to friends. My other lasting memory is the fellowship I enjoyed at Third Presbyterian Church in Meigs Street where again I was welcomed into their 'family', their homes and Sunday lunches at one of the Asian restaurants Rochester had many of.

Please extend my heartfelt thanks and Christmas greetings to the RARA membership for an unforgettable experience and the hospitality I enjoyed while in Rochester at your next meeting.

RaRa Rag 20 Years Ago, January, 1988

Vice-President and Program Chairman Dave Bernheisel, N2DPF, only announced that the next meeting would be on January 8th, no details. John Schooley, K2NC, Chairman of the RaRa Volunteer Examiners, wrote with information on the 1988 amateur examination plans. John took this opportunity to recognize Len Cataldi, N2HS, Dick Critchell, KY2Y and Lou Kohlen, K2ANC for their regular participation on the VE Team. Effective January 1st, 1988, the VE fees went up to \$4.55. Ed Gable, K2MP, Chairman of the RaRa Code and Theory classes, reported on the just finished Fall courses. There, 24 new Novices and 15 new technicians were turned out. The instructors were Bob O'Connell, NF2Z, Ed Gable, K2MP, Joe Phillips, W2DHV and Bud Young, WA2UGE. At the end of the last session tradition was upheld with the instructors holding a small Christmas party for the students. Ed asked for additional instructors to volunteer as there are plans to expand the program to include more hands-on experience for the students. The FCC published amateur figures for the period ending December 1987, with the total of all classes being 430,201, up 2.2% from the figure the previous year.

Ed Holdsworth, N2EH, penned a long article chronicling the busy activities of the RaRa public service corps. Ed pointed out that this tenacious group, as dedicated as they are, still only represent 7% of the total RaRa membership and urges participation by more members.

Winter Fun Fest is coming, exclaimed John Lloyd, KA2KFV. This annual event, held at Mendons Pond Park, is sure to relieve your winter doldrums. The entry fee... a log for the fire place. Hard to beat. With regret it was reported that Joe Klusek, WB2FDZ and John Wolf, K1ESS were reported as silent keys.

Reports from the Beleaguered Northwest:

The coastal regions of Pacific Northwest have been hit with horrific storms with torrential rain and high winds. The results included flooding, mudslides, power outages, and loss of communications. Hams received much deserved credit in the media for their volunteer work in rescue and relief efforts. A sample of reports follows.

On Broadband Reports.com: December 6 the report noted that flooding in the affected areas cut off communications for T-Mobile customers. Combined with closed highways, overloaded communications circuits, and general chaos, Ham Radio operators were praised as heroes. Among other things, they relayed vital information that could not be done by the cripple 911 systems. Oregon Governor Ted Kulongoski said "One of the problems in this is always communication. I'm going to tell you who the heroes were from the very beginning of this...the ham radio operators. These people just came in and actually provided a tremendous communication link to us." KPLU Report: The Seattle NPR affiliate KPLU has an MP3 link the audio of an interview in which Ham Radio operators are praised. [Go to <http://tinyurl.com/2z8acr>.] It noted that phone service was knocked out for two days. Mudslides and 100 mph winds knocked out cell towers. Coastal towns were literally cut off from the rest of the world. A police spokesman noted that their satellite phones were having trouble too. The other problem is public safety officers and rescuers are limited to a restricted number of channels which is insufficient in times of natural disasters. Over 50 hams were called to assist in providing communications coverage.

KATU-TV 2 News Online, Portland OR:

KATU reported the following "With communications down in much of the state smacked by the recent storm, state emergency officials are calling ham radio operators heroes. When even state police had difficulty reaching some of their own troops, ham radio worked, setting up networks so emergency officials could communicate and relaying lists of supplies needed in stricken areas."

The Oregonian: The newspaper reported on December 6 that Clatsop County on the Oregon coast got hit especially hard. The mayor of Astoria, Willis Van Dusen commented "This is Number 1. This was a monster." It was noted that 42 members of the Sunset Empire Amateur Radio Operators Club were assisting with communications because normal modes of communication were down. [Larry's note: The following letter was written by a former Air Force officer upon the death of Brig. Gen. Paul Tibbets Jr., who is best known as the pilot of the *Enola Gay*, the B-29 Super Fortress that dropped the first atomic bomb on Hiroshima on August 6, 1945. World War II ended 9 days later when the Emperor of Japan publicly announced Japan's surrender to his citizens. I did not realize that General Tibbets was a Ham Radio enthusiast. Who would? He is known by the general public only for piloting the *Enola Gay* on that fateful day in the summer of 1945. He was a quiet and private man. I recall seeing only one interview with him, perhaps in the early 1960s, shown recently on the History Channel. General Tibbets made no political comments, he only recounted what he, his crew, and airplane experienced. Likewise, my inclusion of the letter is **not** a political statement in the least. If anything, it is personal. You see, like many of our senior members, my uncles and father were members of that "Greatest Generation" so eloquently described by Tom Brokaw – people that ensured the future for my generation. Some of my relatives were slated for reassignment to the Pacific Theater after VE Day, that is, until the war came to an abrupt halt. Here in its entirety is the letter].

A Tragedy Avoided a Catastrophe

Regarding the death of Brig. Gen. Paul Tibbets Jr., I worked for him for over a year on the B-47 jet bomber project. I later helped him set up his ham radio station in his home at MacDill Air Force Base. I found him to be a

perfectionist – but also a quiet, competent and caring officer who knew war; he flew a B-17 combat tour and was wounded over Germany. He was the ideal officer for the momentous task of ending the war by dropping the first atomic bomb on Aug. 6, 1945. I hope Paul rests in peace.

Detractors do not consider that the invasion of Japan was already massing and would take place in less than three months. The first assault was to be Oct. 27 and a larger one on Kyushu on Nov. 1. Our own leaders expected a million or more U.S. casualties and tens of millions of Japanese in the fight to the death. Japan had 12,725 planes ready to be used as suicide bombs against our fleet.

The National Archives recently released the entire "Top Secret" official invasion documents from the U.S. and Japan. Go to any search engine and type in "Operation Downfall" and read the actual plans. The atomic bomb was a tragedy that avoided a catastrophe and the biggest blood bath in history. Even after the first bomb, the Japanese swore to fight to the last person for the emperor. The second bomb ended the war.

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
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
