

Here's Looking at You!

September is quickly fleeting and soon it will be time for our October RARA meeting. This month's meeting falls right on the first day of the month... Friday, October 1st, 2010, at 7:30 PM. It's our chance to have a 'face-to-face' with each other, socialize some, and enjoy an evening centered around ham radio.

Speaking of 'face-to-face', this month's presentation deals with yet another fascinating aspect of ham radio.... ATV (Amateur Television). According to Wikipedia, Amateur television "is the transmission of broadcast-quality video and audio over radio waves allocated for amateur radio using the broadcast standards of NTSC (National Television System Committee) in North America". It's not all that unusual to hear ATV sometimes referred to as Ham TV and Fast Scan Television (FSTV). There are many UHF ATV repeaters throughout the United States, and one is very close to being up and running in the Monroe County area.



ATV is not just limited to the UHF bands either; tune in around 14.230 MHz on the 20 meter band and you will hear strange sounds... those of Slow Scan Television (SSTV). There is a variety of equipment needed to operate ATV, and there are commercial units available for setting up your own ATV station. There are also plenty of opportunities to experiment with and homebrew your own equipment.

Our presenters are Fred Miller, WO2P, and Judy Stonehill, N2KXS, who have been actively involved with ATV in our area. Both Fred and Judy are members of the Monroe Country ARES / RACES organization, and are developing methods to incorporate ATV into emergency communications. Someone once said that pictures are worth a thousand words, and being able to provide real time pictures during an emergency situation will greatly assist authorities in dealing with what is actually happening.

Their presentation will detail ATV from both a technical and practical perspective. They will also do a live demo of ATV which will show some of the possibilities of ATV, limited only to your own creativity. Let's give Fred and Judy a warm RARA welcome!




Did you know?...Project Prepare is an initiative of Monroe County's Office of Emergency Management that started with putting all-hazard radios into the hands of community groups to alert and pass emergency-related information. Hundreds of all-hazard radios were configured and distributed to fire, police and ambulance departments, schools, community centers, churches, special needs, and hard-to-reach populations within our community. The local RACES organization assisted by programming over a hundred of the Specific Area Message Encoded (SAME) all-hazard radios, and making people and resources available in case some organizations needed configuration and troubleshooting assistance. Monroe County is one of the few counties nationwide that has agreements with the National Weather Service to directly access local all-hazard/weather radio transmitters in times of emergencies to notify and inform residents via the alert radios. Monroe County's Project Prepare (<http://www.monroecounty.gov/safety-projectprepare>) has morphed into a community emergency training initiative and should have a RACES representative to join the business, government, first-responder, NGO/Red Cross and faith-based organizations. If you can volunteer an hour each month for a morning meeting, email RACES Radio Officer, Jim DiTucci, (n2ixd@arrl.net).

Monroe County LEPC

As a direct result of the Union Carbide chemical disaster in Bhopal, India, on December 2nd and 3rd, 1984, (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Bhopal_disaster) the US federal government mandated that US counties institute Local Emergency Preparedness Committees (LEPC's) to evaluate and minimize the impact of such disasters in this country.

(<http://yosemite.epa.gov/oswer/lepddb.nsf/HomePage?openForm>) Due to the potential for local emergencies, RACES can be activated by Monroe County for chemical as well as other disasters.

Monroe County's LEPC meets nearly every month at 1190 Scottsville Road at the Office of Emergency Management's operations center. For the rest of 2010, the LEPC meetings will be held at 8:30 AM, on October 13, and November 10. Sign in as an amateur radio / RACES guest to show our commitment; refreshments are available.

Several important planning and legislative initiatives have been introduced. These include: EPA's voluntary Chemical Emergency Preparedness Program started after the December 1984 accident in Bhopal, India, the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act of 1986, Accidental Release Prevention requirements, and the Clean Air Act. These initiatives address the entire safety continuum dealing with chemical accident preparedness, response, and prevention.

NY QSO Party - October 16, 1400z

The Rochester DX Association is again sponsoring the NY QSO Party. This is the second year of the NYQP after a 25+ year hiatus.

The 2010 NYQP runs on October 16 at 10:00 AM local time for twelve hours. Here is your chance to be the "chased" in a contest. Whether you are a serious contester, casual, or looking towards adding to your County Awards total, the NYQP has something for you. All modes including SSB, CW and RTTY/Digital will be activated. There are certificates and over 35 plaques sponsored for participants.

Beginning this year is the inclusion of a new category, the "**Contest Rookie Award**", for those licensed since January 2007. This gives newer operators a chance to compete against those that don't have years of experience, antenna farms and high power.

We are always looking for mobile stations to travel through counties. Each county change gives you the opportunity to work every station again as a new multiplier. Post your travels beforehand on the NYQP web site so others will know where to look for you. Mobiles are the backbone of any QSO Party. There is a list of the rarest NY Counties to help plan your route. Being a stateside contest, signals should be strong. Take a friend and make a day of it.

NYQP 101—A Primer

What's so special about the NYQP? It's YOUR event! As a New York-based amateur radio station this is your chance to be in the spotlight. You've listened to other contests and while tuning up and down the dial you've encountered many stations effortlessly receiving the attention of numerous calls. It's like being the popular kid on the playground. Everyone wants to play with them. In reality, those stations just happen to be in the right place at the right time. NYQP is YOUR time. You become the popular kid; everyone will want to put YOU in their logbook. Sound exciting? It is! But, if you're not a practiced contester, you probably feel a little intimidated or at least reluctant to give it a try. That's why I've written these guidelines to get you started:

1. Don't worry about a score – Have fun. If it's not fun, pull the plug.
2. Most of the activity during the day will be found on 40 and 80 meters. Yup, I know that sounds weird but start by listening on 40 and 80. As a newcomer, find another station calling CQ NYQP and listen to his or her technique. Get a feel for the rhythm of the call; it's almost like a song.
3. Answer their call and make your first exchange.
 - a. Answer the CQ with your call sign (use phonetics for clarity).
 - b. The other station will reply by repeating your call, a "59", and his or her county as a 3 character abbreviation (Monroe = MON).
 - c. You return with his/her call, "59", and your county abbreviation. You'll find a list of county abbreviations at: www.nyqp.org/NewsLetters/NY_Counties.pdf.
 - d. He/she will reply with some form of thank you and then "QRZ" which completes your QSO and is an invitation for another station to have a turn.
4. Now you're free to tune around and find a few more stations to answer (called "Search & Pounce") or roll up your sleeves and call CQ yourself.
5. To call CQ, find another station calling CQ NYQP like above and find a clear frequency nearby. We want people who work the other guy to easily find us and give us a QSO. Think of it as two fishermen working off each other's bait. When you find a frequency listen for a few moments to be sure it's clear then:
 - a. Transmit and ask "Is this frequency in use?" If no one replies you're good to go.
 - b. Call "CQ CQ CQ – (your call in phonetics) NYQP contest."
 - c. Listen for 10-20 seconds – if there are no replies repeat your "chant". Remember, if you're not transmitting (calling CQ or working a station) no one tuning past your frequency will know your there. So keep the frequency active. There will be times when you'll be calling CQ for minutes with no replies, don't be discouraged - Persevere.
 - d. When someone replies to your hail excitement may cause you to pause, but fear not; all is well. Gather your composure and repeat their call with the exchange of "59" and your county abbreviation.
 - e. They in turn will respond back to you with "59" and their 3 letter county abbreviation.
 - f. Lastly you reply with a confirmation of their exchange and call "Q R-Zed".
 - i. Consider this an opportunity to impart a little personality to what could be a mechanical process. Try something like: "Thank you for (their county), have fun in the contest, Q R-Zed."
 - ii. If you recognize the other station, feel free to acknowledge them! "Thanks for the contact Peter, see you at the RaRa meeting on the 5th."

- g. Once you say “Q R-Zed” you can expect the next station in the queue to reply to you. If none do, call CQ again. Remember to keep the frequency active so passersby know you’re there and will stop to say HI.
- 6. If you call CQ for 10+ minutes without a reply, (make sure your SWR is below 3:1) tune up and down the band a little and see if there is any activity. It may be time to change frequency or bands. Activity will wax and wane, go with the flow and have fun.

If you’re a CW or digital mode operator, tune around and listen. The exchange is similar to the above. A quick example of a voice exchange between WB2QMY and my station would go like this:

Me:
CQ CQ CQ Whiskey Bravo Two Papa Yankee Delta NYQP contest.
(listening then repeat) CQ CQ CQ Whiskey Bravo Two Papa Yankee Delta NYQP contest.
Kevin:
Whiskey Bravo Two Quebec Mike Yankee
Me:
WB2QMY 59 Alpha Lima Lima (my station is in Allegany county and the code is ALL)
Kevin:
Thanks for Alpha Lima Lima – please copy 59 Oscar November Tango (Kevin is in Ontario county and the code is ONT)
Me:
Thanks Kev, send my regards to the family. Q R-Zed.

These are not “hard and fast” rules, just an example to demonstrate how easy and casual the NYQP will be. Feel free to improvise and assert your own style. No one will be commenting or critiquing your operating style or proficiency of exchange. You’ll find it a moderate to slow paced event with spurts of activity. A fun mix and a great way to fill your log book with friends and new acquaintances alike. So go give it a try, odds are good you’ll like it. If not, at least you can say you tried it.

Ham Tech

As more and more of us use electronic logbooks for our ham radio contacts there is a real need to keep the data safe. If your hard drive were to crash or your computer and the USB stick sitting next to the computer were stolen, how would you get your logbook back?

Backing up your logbook regularly to a USB stick or a portable hard drive is good, but do you store it in a safe place that is theft and fire resistant? You can upload all your QSOs to Logbook of the World and/or eQSL. From these two web based programs you can export all of your uploaded QSOs to an ADIF file that could be uploaded into a newly-created logbook on your computer.

My favorite option is to use a program called Dropbox available at www.dropbox.com as a free download with 2 GB of free storage. Dropbox allows you to store your logbook and any other very important documents securely on the web out of harms way. The program will place a Dropbox folder on your desktop for easy click, drag, and drop storage.

Whenever I make changes to my logbook I export the entire logbook from Ham Radio Deluxe as an ADIF file and drag a dated copy of the file into my Dropbox folder. Backup and peace of mind have never been easier.

Spotlight On: Peter Schuch, WB2UAQ

1. What got you interested in ham radio?

Learning about signaling (flags: wig wag, flashing lights using Morse Code) in the *Boy Scout Handbook*, and then SWLing with a Lafayette regenerative radio kit I built when I was 12 years old. The members of the Tri-state VHF Association (NJ, NY and CT) were my mentors, gave me my Novice exam (first callsign WN2UAQ) and helped me obtain a Heathkit DX-35 transmitter and a Hallicrafters S-108 receiver.

I also had very supportive parents. My Dad was a machinist and taught me how to work with metal such as bending sheet metal into a chassis, drilling holes and mounting tube sockets. He also brought home a lot of discarded electrical parts such as relays and transformers which were very handy when a separate transmitter and receiver had to work together with one antenna. I homebrewed several tube QRP transmitters and modified ARC-5 transmitters for use on 40 and 80 meters. I also built a 2 meter converter based on the famous MPF102 FET. Matching a rig to an antenna already started to spur my interest so I built several L-network transmatches in those early days including a homebrewed SWR meter.

2. What are your favorite activities in the hobby?

In the mid 1980s I gravitated towards homebrewing RF test equipment such as impedance bridges. I then became addicted to RF measurements when older generation commercial equipment from HP, General Radio, etc. started to show up at hamfests. A lot of my measurements are done on antennas but just about any radio or radio component characteristic is of interest to me.

My favorite component to experiment with is the transmission line transformer, more commonly known as the balun. There are so many confusing aspects of these devices that I was determined to understand what made them function as well as they do! Just the core materials used for these devices became an obsession with me for a few years.

For the last several years the early history of radio has taken my attention so I joined the AWA and am a very novice tour guide at the AWA Museum.

2-meter FM is my most active mode because I need to get to and from work. On HF my most active mode is SSB but CW is close to my heart so, despite my low activity, I can still manage a reasonable level of code proficiency.

3. How long have you been licensed?

For about 45 years now.

4. How long have you been a RARA member?

8 years.

ARRL Honorary Vice President Hugh Turnbull, W3ABC, of Silver Spring, Maryland, died September 14 at age 93. Turnbull served the ARRL as Atlantic Division Vice Director (1980-1982) and Director (1982-1996). The ARRL Board named him Vice President in 1996 and Honorary Vice President in 2000.

Aside from his long and distinguished service to the ARRL, Hugh was actively involved in several DC-area Amateur Radio clubs and organizations, including the Foundation for Amateur Radio, a group of clubs from the Maryland, Washington, DC and Northern Virginia area that awards scholarships to deserving radio amateurs. In 2005, the Quarter Century Wireless Association awarded Turnbull a special plaque recognizing his "exceptional contributions to Amateur Radio in general and for outstanding work in the selection of recipients for the QCWA scholarship awards." He was also a charter member of the Goddard Amateur Radio Club.

A licensed and active radio amateur since 1932, Hugh's engineering career included employment with the FCC, the Voice of America and NASA.

Upon hearing of his death, ARRL President Kay Craigie, N3KN, who served as Atlantic Division Vice Director during Hugh's tenure as Director, said: "Hugh's life was devoted to serving his country and Amateur Radio. Many times I heard him say that each of us should 'give something back' to ham radio. He was my first mentor in ARRL leadership, and it was my good fortune to have his example to learn from."

ARRL Chief Executive Officer David Sumner, K1ZZ, added: "Hugh was an exemplary member of 'The Greatest Generation' who unselfishly took on whatever needed to be done for the common good."

According to his daughter, Karen Shangraw, Turnbull will be buried with full military honors at Arlington National Cemetery.

Judge: Amateur Radio Is Not a Cell Phone

In many states and localities, it is illegal to talk on a cell phone (without a hands-free device) while behind the wheel—doing so can result in a ticket and possibly a large fine. But on May 30, 2010, when a New York ham was talking on his mobile rig, he didn't think he was doing anything wrong. Except that the officer who pulled him over and cited him with a \$100 fine didn't quite see it that way.

Steve Bozak, WB2IQU, of Clifton Park, told the ARRL that when he was pulled over while driving to Troy—about 16 miles away—he assured the officer that he was not speaking on a cell phone, but on his handheld transceiver. But according to Bozak, the officer said “it was all the same to him.” So Bozak decided to fight the ticket in court.

“Honestly, it's not the fine or the ticket, but that all the other hams who use mobile radios have to hide the fact we are mobile in Troy,” he told the ARRL just days after he was cited. “I will do my best to settle this politely and correctly, for all of the ham community. So I will follow the course and have my day in court, to ‘tell it to the judge.’ This matter affects 38,000 hams in New York State.”

Unfortunately, when Bozak had his day in court for a pre-trial conference, the prosecutor refused to dismiss the case. But he didn't give up and took his case to City Court where, on September 8, where at the request of Bozak's attorney -- ARRL Volunteer Counsel ([VC](#)) Jeremy Rase, KC2JRD -- the judge dismissed the case in Bozak's favor. Bozak argued that his use “of a handheld Amateur Radio does not fit the definition of a mobile telephone, and as such, the present charge should be dismissed.” The prosecutor's office did not submit a response in opposition.

Saying that New York's Vehicle and Traffic Law defines a “Mobile Telephone” as a “device used by subscribers and other users of wireless telephone service to access such service,” and that a “Wireless Telephone Service” is defined as “two-way real time voice tele-communications service that is interconnected to a public switched telephone network and is provided by a commercial mobile radio service,” the judge decided that Bozak's handheld transceiver did not fit that description.

“A review of 47 C.F.R. §20.3 reveals that Citizens Band Radio Service is defined under private mobile radio service not commercial mobile radio service,” the decision read. “Therefore, the Court finds that the use of an Amateur Radio device does not fit the definition of a mobile telephone as defined under the Vehicle and Traffic Law” As such, the judge dismissed the case in Bozak's favor.

“While the court cited the Citizens Band Service instead of the Amateur Radio Service, the ruling very is favorable to amateurs on the precise point of law raised,” said ARRL Regulatory Information Manager Dan Henderson, N1ND. “The principle of law is spot on. This is a great ruling in New York and exactly what we had thought would happen.”
