## October Meeting - Getting To Know Your Neighbors

This catchy title serves as a clue to what Jim Sutton, N2OPS, will be sharing at our October meeting. Jim is well known around our area as an expert in the world of VHF-UHF scanning. These are the frequencies that our police, fire, coast guard, utilities, and public safety personnel, among others, use to communicate. Listening in on these frequencies can be exciting, and enlightening.

At the RARA meeting on October 7 "Getting to Know Your Neighbors" will take a look at the history of scanner listening in the Rochester area, the current scene including APCO P25 and a look at the 700 MHz system on the way for Monroe County. Jim will detail each county's current system and where each is heading.

Jim began listening to scanners in 1965, and today Jim writes an article for each issue of *National Communications* on various topics of interest to scanner listeners. For 14 years Jim set up thousands of scanners for scanner listeners, and gathered data about frequencies, unit numbering, and codes which went into *Scanner Radio Data*. This book aided scanner listeners in the Rochester area in programming their scanners and understanding what they were hearing. This book is a big success, with 18 printings!

Jim was first licensed in 1989, and currently Jim leads a youth ham club called The Fishermen's Net KC2RHY, in Mount Morris, NY. Weekly classes are held there and consist of "hamsters" studying for their Technician license. There will be time for questions and answers, and Jim is suggesting that you send him your questions ahead of time. Questions can be sent to him at [jim@otrym.org](mailto:jim@otrym.org).

## The Prez Sez

This month I have a lot to tell you. First is about the By-Laws change I mentioned at the September meeting. The purpose of these amendments is to synchronize the club calendars. Currently we have three different calendar cycles: A fiscal year (Sept. 1 – Aug. 31), Membership (Nov. 1 – Oct. 31), and Officers terms (May – May). We propose leaving the fiscal year as-is, and correlating the membership term and officer's term to a single calendar beginning October 1<sup>st</sup>. This would mean moving elections to the September meeting; with newly elected officers taking office on Oct. 1<sup>st</sup>. It would also allow us to use the new Fall Banquet in September to “kick-off” the New Year. You will find the existing and proposed amendments elsewhere in this issue of the RAG. Comments and discussion will be welcomed at the October meeting.

Second is our Hamfest... Four years ago we set out on a mission to revive the Rochester Hamfest from what appeared to be a downward spiral of certain demise. Without looking back, the newly appointed Hamfest Committee started with a clean slate and the sole objective was to provide the most enjoyable Hamfest without losing money for the club. It was obvious by the feedback and comments from the very beginning that we had the blueprint for a winning event. Each of the past three years saw attendance grow, and the event proved financially viable. The inaugural 2009 event was blessed with blue skies and a flyover by none other than the US Navy Blue Angels. In 2010 storms threatened and early morning rains dampened some, but cleared by mid-morning to make for a good day overall for the growing crowds. June 2011 had mixed forecasts but heavy rains came in the mid-morning calling an early end to what was building to a record crowd. Just before the heaviest rains came, the general parking manager reported that we only had room for about 20 more cars!

The bottom line is that in just three years the Hamfest has outgrown the Barnard Carnival grounds; far sooner than we ever expected. As they say: “It’s a good problem to have.” So... “Here we GROW again!” The Hamfest Production Committee would like to acknowledge the generosity and hospitality of the Barnard Fire Department. Thanks for three great events. We need more space and we’re tired of being at the mercy of the weather, so beginning this June, the Rochester Hamfest will call HOME to the Rochester Institute of Technology campus. Not only will we have ample general parking (paved and striped), we will have large amounts of tailgating space also paved and striped. No stones, dirt, mud, or soggy grass to contend with. But here’s the ultimate new feature: **60,000 square feet of pristine, air conditioned, indoor flea market space in the Gordon Field House!** Yes, the Rochester Hamfest is now WEATHERPROOF! Never again will we care if it rains, snows, sleets, or hails; we won’t care if it’s 30 degrees or 100 – we’ll all be comfortable – INDOORS! To emphasize our long-standing relationship with RIT, and the greater breadth of technology, we are now calling the event “The Rochester Hamfest and Technology Expo”. The excitement is spreading like wildfire; 24 hours after our official announcement on the website, a new vendor signed up to come to our new venue. Tower Electronics of Green Bay Wisconsin will be returning to the Rochester Hamfest!

### Article I. Membership

#### Section F. Term

Currently reads: "Membership extends from November 1 of each year to October 31 of the following year."

Proposed change: "Membership extends from October 1 of each year to September 30 of the following year."

### Article II. Meetings of Members

#### Section A. Annual Meeting

Currently reads: "The Annual Meeting will be held in the month of May of each year, the day and time to be set by the Board of Directors and announced at the preceding regular membership meeting. The business transacted at the Annual Meeting shall include (1) election of officers, (2) election of Board of Directors, and (3) determination of dues for the following year."

Proposed change: "The Annual Meeting will be held in the month of September of each year, the day and time to be set by the Board of Directors and announced at the preceding regular membership meeting. The business transacted at the Annual Meeting shall include (1) election of officers, (2) election of Board of Directors, and (3) determination of dues for the following year."





# Ham Tech: Google Earth

Many people have used Google Earth to get a satellite picture of their house or research a new area they are going to visit. To enhance the experience with Google Earth people have created files that overlay on the Google Earth map. Some of these overlays contain ham radio related information. First, you need Google Earth loaded on your computer. Next you need to download the .kml or .kmz files. When you double-click on the .kml or .kmz file it will open Google Earth and overlay the file information on the map. Save this to My Places and it will save it in Google Earth. Be careful not to check too many of these overlays at the same time or it will take a long time to load Google Earth. Some ham radio files to try are:



**APRS:** <http://aprs.fi/> - On the right side of the screen click on the link "Google Earth KML ?" and download the .kml file.

## 20 Years Ago, October, 1991

VP and Program Chairman Lloyd Caves, WB2EFU, reported that the next program had the interesting title of *Robots Today*. The presenter was Mr. Jean Duteau of Brooks Robotics. Lloyd also wrote to announce a special Banquet planned to celebrate RaRa's 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Planned for early December, the event has scheduled many important speakers from RaRa's past and from the ARRL. More details coming up in the next 20 Year Column.

An interesting article by Dana Jonas, WA2WNI, introduced the idea of added purposes for Packet Radio users with a focus on DX Clusters. RaRa President Peter Secrist, WB2SUN, in his column wrote to encourage participation in RaRa's 60<sup>th</sup> celebration. Peter also commented that of the last three public service events he participated in most all of the volunteers were that same groups of dedicated hams. He encouraged more participation by all RaRa members.

Local DXers were very pleased and most fortunate to have a new DX columnist by the name of Fred Gern, KB2SE. This issue saw Fred announcing exciting new countries of Walvis Bay ZS9, North Korea P5 and Penquin Island ZS1. On-the-air after long absences were Albania ZA, Afghanistan YA and Burma XY. With regret it was announced that Ken Hovey K2CTN and William Tronzo WB2OEV were reported as silent keys. From the Want Ads you could buy a Drake R4A/T4X combination for \$400 from Gene, W2LU. A new commercial advertiser was Kurt, K3KH, offering flight instruction and scenic flights.

## 40 Years Ago, October, 1971

The October meeting was an interesting look back in time with a program titled *Where the Hams Began* by RaRa's old timer Ducky Dengler, K2LK. RaRa President Richard Koehn, WB2SNA, announced the following committee chairs for the 71/72 RaRa season: Harold Smith WA2KND, Hamfest, Joan Vogt WA2YTK, Membership, Bob Pavlock WA2ECD, Awards, Tom Ball WA2THS, Joe Hood K2YAH and Bob Lauzon WB2NSD, Licensing Class and Pat Hoke W2CYG, Auction.

John Lucas, WA2BEH, in his VHF column, reported that Chuck Oneske, K2YCO, achieved the first USA/VE Tropo QSO on 1296 MHz with VE2HW. New RaRa members were listed as Dave K2SQI (SK) Dave Hallidy WB2ZEA, Ken W2UAD, Fred WB2BQA and Al W2ZUX (SK). # Aviation Scanning

by Jim Sutton, N2OPS

Aircraft radio is about the most basic form of communications to be found. While nearly the entire spectrum has gone through radical changes in modulation for security, more efficient spectrum use, and data transmission, aircraft radio has remained AM modulation. This allows a weak distress signal to be heard where with FM the weaker signal would have much less chance of being heard.

Most scanners include the 108-137 MHz commercial aircraft band, but few include the 225-380 MHz military aircraft band. A few inexpensive scanners omit aircraft coverage completely because it requires incorporating AM reception.

Because of the line-of-sight characteristics of aviation frequencies, listeners will hear aircraft in the air at greater distances than those of base stations. Enroute stations often transmit from more than one site, which increases the chances of hearing the base half of the conversation.

The unofficial air-to-air 123.450 MHz is a fun "party line" chat frequency to monitor.


