## Electromagnetic Radiation is Spoiling my DNA, but All May Be Well (Done)

Truth be told, I don't care if excessive exposure to electromagnetic radiation, such as RF, is causing mutations in your DNA that may lead to a disease in you or your unborn kids. However, I do care about me and my kids so I have spent a fair amount of time learning what I can about the potential dangers of RF exposure. As a geneticist and a ham I have a keen interest in any negative effects electromagnetic radiation may have on humans.

For the general public, and the non-geneticists among us, the conflicting reports which appear regularly in the popular and professional press are confusing. This is compounded by the suspicion that cell phone companies are trying to downplay any harmful effects of RF for obvious commercial reasons. This confusion has raised public awareness and concern about the risks of RF exposure which in turn has prompted the FCC to publish policies on human exposure to RF energy that we are expected to understand. I would not call them light reading (pun intended, but admittedly it is weak). Interestingly, concerns about exposure to electromagnetic radiation range from electric blankets and overhead power lines to microwave ovens and UV light.



In addition to any genetic effects, another potential concern is tissue heating. To date most of the studies conducted suggest that this is a greater concern than DNA damage. Many half-baked ideas have come to light about interactions between electromagnetic radiation and human tissues, some are unsubstantiated but we must look at all of them in order to really understand the risks.

This month Gary Skuse, KA1NJL and Professor of Biological Sciences at RIT, will talk about the effects of RF and other forms of electromagnetic radiation on humans. He promises not to deliver a college lecture but rather will make this complex subject interesting, understandable and, whether appropriate or not, humorous. Please join us for the next RARA meeting on Friday October 4<sup>th</sup> at the usual location, the Henrietta Fire Company #1 located at 3129 East Henrietta Road near Lehigh Station Road.





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# RaRa Rags of the Past

## 20 Years Ago, October, 1993

I need to start by saying thanks to Irv AF2K, for lending me his copy of this issue as my file turned up empty.

The meeting scheduled for October turned out to be a disaster, a well thought-out and planned disaster, however. The guest speaker was a man many of us knew from Civil-Defense drills and actual experience. Sandy Macaluso, Operation and Planning Officer of the Monroe County Office of Emergency Preparedness, gave an explanation of what his office consists of and how RaRa and RACES fits into the mix. RaRa President Keith Freeberg, N2BEL, wrote to welcome members to another season of RaRa meetings. He also told of the starting of another session of Code and Theory classes the last of which added 40 to 60 new RaRa members. Those new members, according to Keith, should be sought out and welcomed as you see them at the meetings.

Our neighbors to the East, the Radio Amateurs of Greater Syracuse (RAGS) wrote in to say they have a new hamfest location that no longer requires flea market folks to share places with cows and other farm animals. It was a good move as this author remembers. With regret it was announced that Aaron Goldenberg KB2AQQ and W. Eidman Sr. WB2CTO, were listed as Silent Keys. From the Want Ads you could buy any or all of three transceivers from Al Wagner WB2BNJ. "Learn to Fly" was the advertising slogan of Bob Boyack, K2OXT, one of the then current commercial advertisers.

## 40 Years Ago, October, 1973

RaRa VP Joe Hood, K2YAH, reported on an exciting program for the evening. It was then that Rick Booth, WA2GCX, made the announcement that the new 19/79 Repeater WR2ABF, would be offering the use of their new Autopatch. This feature allowed any repeater user with touch-tone capability to make local phone calls, on a non-commercial basis, through the Repeater. Rick explained how the system worked, how to use it, and thrilled people on this new medium by on-air demonstrations.

President Bob Lauzon, WB2NSD, announced the start of this season's Code and Theory classes at a new location on the RIT campus at 50 West Main Street, Rochester. Bob also announced the formation of a Member's Relations Committee, Eddie Dunn (SK) W2ECH Chairman, with the responsibility to act as a liaison to allow easy access to the RaRa Board of Directors by members. Other committee members were; Linc Cundall (SK) W2QY, Ed Gable W2MPM, and Ernie Crewdson WA2FVG. Otto Bluntzer WB2RJB, writing for the Rochester VHF Group, told of their special meeting to celebrate their 25<sup>th</sup> year. # Hamfest Find: Classic SB-313 Receiver

July 20<sup>th</sup> was a rainy Saturday at this year's Batavia Hamfest, and not many showed up. Still, it was enjoyable. I (AA2YV) found a battered Buck Rogers space ship in a box of free toy stuff. This winter it will get a coat of yellow and red paint.

A seasoned ham had two WWII frequency meters for sale, each at about 10 bucks, and a Heathkit SB-313 solid state receiver. He had come down from about \$100 to \$60, but took \$50 for it. It had begun to rain a bit more. On the bench at home, and under good light, this radio was pristine, except for a little dent on the top front left of the enclosure. This was made mostly "unbent" by shaped wood forms and a C-clamp. This receiver is a bit rare, since it was the SWL version of Heath's SB-303. They didn't sell many. This particular radio had not really been used. The front plate and knobs were mint, and it had all three filters: AM; SSB; CW.

The radio had been cleanly soldered. I replaced the electrolytic caps on the rear power supply board, but left the AF electrolytics for the moment... The radio came to life immediately. The output voltage, bias and S-meter levels were easily set. There was a 60 cycle hum, however, with the AF gain turned down, yet inaudible at operating levels.

Now it was Ned's (W2NED) turn. After performing some minor repairs to reduce the bothersome AC hum, he would put the SB-313 through its paces, using relatively straightforward test equipment. So, how does this radio stack up against today's receivers?

The original 1971 QST product evaluation indicated that the SB-313 was in a league with the best receivers and possibly the best Heathkit had built to date. With scant documentation – the 303 schematic and some alignment figures – Ned set to work.

To begin with, I (W2NED) replaced the electrolytic caps on the audio board, re-soldered several grounding points, and cleaned the PC board connectors. This decreased the hum such that it was not noticeable using my Bose amplified, PC speakers. It was, however, still audible while listening with high quality headphones and it was still visible on the spectrum view of the audio from within Ham Radio Deluxe, HRD, on my PC.

Regardless of whether the hum can be further reduced and to reduce the effects of hum while making performance measurements, I decided to make the minimum detectable signal, MDS, measurements by using the HRD spectrum display, rather than by using an AC voltmeter.

In preparation for the MDS measurement, I set the RF gain to maximum, the RF attenuation to minimum and the AGC to off. Then, I selected the 400 Hz CW filter and adjusted the AF volume to about 50%.

The first graph shows the noise-only audio spectrum. The dark line is the average signal level. The 60 cycle hum, plus two harmonics, can be observed in the lower left at about 10 dB below the noise floor, which is indicated by the top of the envelope of the 400 Hz IF bandpass. Presently, this radio's bandpass center is set to about 1100 Hz. (When we get more specs, we can adjust the IF bandpass and CW side-tone closer to 800 Hz.) Note that the relative magnitude of the noise floor is -70db.



To estimate the minimum detectable signal, I used the Elecraft XG3 to generate a calibrated 1uV, -107 dBm, signal at 7.04 MHz. The signal generator was connected to the radio's antenna input, and the receiver was tuned to center the signal in the CW bandpass. The second graph shows the resulting spectrum.


Notice that the signal-plus-noise peaks at -40 db. This represents a S+N/N ratio of 30 dB (70dB - 40dB). Since the input signal is -107 dBm, the minimum detectable signal is about 30 dB less than the reference input signal. This means the minimum detectable signal is about -137 dBm. So, from a sensitivity perspective, the SB-313 is every bit as good as the best receivers produced today.

I also noticed that the stability of the local oscillator is outstanding, given the technology at the time. I can jiggle the receiver on the desk and it stays right on frequency.

The receiver tunes CW, SSB and AM signals very nicely -- except for a slight delay in the tuning dial about 200 kHz up from band bottom, owing probably to an anomaly in the plastic molding part of the dial mechanism. I noticed that the USB and CW filters are aligned such that one can tune a CW signal with the 2.5 KHz SSB filter in USB mode, then switch to CW, and hear a very clear, narrow signal right in the bandpass with no retuning required.

While selectivity and adjacent channel rejection are quite good, they are not on a par with the better receivers of today. We did not pursue additional detailed measurements at this time.

In an attempt to further reduce the hum, we will check that AF board for hairline cracks and bad solder joints. We'll also replace two small coax runs. Finally, after we clean the wafer switches a bit more, this radio will be a "keeper."

What's GOODIE Patrol you ask? This is probably one of the most important tasks of the evening. Halloween can be cold, rainy, snowy or fairly pleasant. The job of the goody patrol is to split up and visit all of those on the bridges and bring drink, goodies and most importantly conversation to a somewhat lonely operator. A simple test of what the repeater hears can be made as follows: Simply state your callsign and enter 700\* from your tone pad, release the mic, and wait for response from repeater saying "Ready." At this point, key up again stating your call and the word "TESTING" and release your PTT. The repeater will play back what it heard. Please be sure your radio has 110.9 Hz PL active. If there are any questions, please see me for a demo at the RARA meeting.

- PATRIOTIC** With station and skill always ready for service to country and community
