THREE FOXES FOUND IN VICTOR

Saturday May 9th was XARC's annual hidden transmitter hunt, traditionally held on CQ worldwide foxhunt weekend. I designed this hunt to be easy enough for beginners, but also added two more transmitters for a more challenging hunt. The hunt began in Dryer Rd. Park in Victor. There are dozens of mountain bike trails here and I worried about hunters getting run over, but we were able to co-exist with the bikes without incident. We started with a practice fox in the parking lot and most of the 8 teams got very close to finding it (hidden in my car), some with newly constructed tape measure beams, or their first time with body fade techniques and their HTs. Jarred, KF2MR, and his seven year old daughter Danica were the only

team to actually find the practice fox. This was their first XARC hunt and Jarred was wearing his Yaesu FT-817 around his neck and using its built-in variable attenuator with a rubber duck antenna with great results, until the battery died.

The first competition transmitter was hidden inside the park and it was a newly designed quad-fox I put together recently, four transmitters in one case. The first of the four co-located transmitters is an Alinco DJ-C1 VHF 300mW HT connected to a Byonics PicCon fox controller. To make this easier for the beginners, a second, lower power transmitter on a different frequency was also in the same box. This was a Raspberry Pi computer running the PiFox software with no additional hardware. The Pi played a computer synthesized voice message on 146.565 at very low power, only detectable from about 100 feet. The two other transmitters making up the quad-fox were a wifi access point and an audible beeper.



Jarred and Danica got close to the transmitter and circled it several times while hearing the lower power message, but failed to think 3 dimensionally and look up in the tree to see the gray ammo box in plain sight. All the other hunters found the fox in less than an hour and we re-convened at the starting point to start the next leg of the hunt by car. Of the remaining two transmitters, only one was strong enough to be heard, and even then not by all of us, so I suggested they re-start at Finger Lakes Community College's Victor campus on Route 251 three miles north, where both foxes could be clearly heard. A ½ watt W2NED/W2VAB foxmitter was hidden in Lehigh Crossing Park, between FLCC and Van Bortel Ford on Route 96. Another foxmitter with an 8 watt transmitter was 2 miles west in Fishers Park, along a nice trail between a swamp and a creek. Both had external antennas up in the trees.



Will KC2VSJ and Scott KC2ZQU were able to find all three foxes and take the lowest numbered tags for the best score of the day. Ned W2NED and Gregory also found all three and tied for second place with the team of Rich K2RAH, Bill K2WEK and Paul KC2GTO. Jarrod and Danica teamed up with Bob K2OID to find a second fox. Lee WB2JOR teamed with W2NED to find two foxes.

Rookie hunters that were able to find the first fox were Kelly and Chris KC2VCK, Harry KD2DWA, and Sandy KA2HQZ.

We met for our traditional post-foxhunt lunch at Mickey Finn's in Victor for some welcome air conditioning, cold drinks, good food and fox hunt bonding.

Gimmicks like multiple transmitters are my way of trying to spice up the hunt and make it interesting for those of us that have been doing this for over 15 years, but more gimmicks can sometimes add confusion to the hunt and this one was no exception. Foxhunt fever can also be a factor even for us veteran hunters, when your adrenaline gets flowing and you charge through the prickles/swamps/cliffs instead of looking for an easier way to the fox. I'm glad we had a great turnout, especially from some rookie hunters, and hopefully they'll be back for more fun in October for our Fall hunt.

If you've been wanting to try foxhunting, but haven't been able to make it to one of ours, consider hosting your own. We'll lend you the transmitter and help with other logistics or you can just wrap a rubber band around an HT. When the hunters get close, they'll hear themselves coming over the air. You can hunt with your club, grandchildren, hamfest, etc. even

indoors. Hiding the fox can be just as fun as hunting, especially if you can watch the hunters, or help the kids learn how to body fade.

RADIO ASTRONOMY NEWS

Our project **Callisto** RF Solar Spectrograph, to study RF emissions from the Sun's eruptions (Sunspots, CMEs, etc.) is progressing nicely. This project is designed to contribute to a global network of radio telescopes called 'eCallisto'. It consists of a converted 7 foot 'C' band dish, that will track the Sun from rise to set. Its front end and receiver is a special modified digital TV tuner (50 – 850 Mhz), controlled by a microprocessor, for both bandwidth and center frequency. Data is collected by a dedicated ATX PC running Windows 7. This data will be uploaded to a central server (in Zurich, SW) when we're fully operational, where it is archived for use by astronomers and scientists to better understand our source of heat, light and gravity.

This month we'd like to share our RT demo at RIT's Imagine festival at the beginning of last month (May). The 'Brown Dwarfs' senior design team successfully demonstrated autonomous tracking of the Sun, regardless of weather (clouds, rain, etc.) . With the present system, we can track ANY celestial object.


Additionally, we've characterized the local (to Ionia, NY) DTV and Radio Emitters mentioned in last month's newsletter, and we have identified FM radio, Cell Phone, and DTV stations (the vertical dotted lines are known area DTV center frequencies). We've started a proof of concept hardware model to support a software removal algorithm of these 'bad actors' from our data (maybe this summer?)

ANTENNA PROJECT

In the morning of Saturday 16 May, RARA members Mike W2KSW, Gary KC2YTD, Chuck KC2KPL, Anand KC2KPG, Bill K2WEK, and JJ KD2HJA gathered for an installment of the RARA Academy, led by John NV2K and Gary KA1NJL.

The subject of this session was to construct a dual-band (20m and 15m) HF antenna based on the coupled resonator principle developed by Gary Breed K9AY and discussed in several articles in QST by Joel Hallas W1ZR. The 20m element is fed as a typical dipole, while the 15m element is fed parasitically, as a sleeve element.


The bands were selected for their world-wide propagation capabilities, as well as the relatively compact size of the antenna. The finished antennas are about 34' long, and will fit into a small back yard. For those of you who missed it (were you in Dayton that weekend?) and still want to build one, another opportunity is being planned.

GANANDA SCIENCE FAIR 2015

Several months ago, Gananda Middle School asked RARA to give a ham radio presentation at their science fair. The fair was expanding to the high school, and the organizers wanted to showcase some technologies that would interest the students and their families. I offered to lead the effort, and although I didn't get the crush of volunteers I hoped for, the ones I got are the best ambassadors of ham radio I could have hoped for.

We arrived at the Gananda High School on April 27th at 5:30 and had 30 minutes to setup. We quickly erected the off-center fed dipole, designed and built by W2NED, with one end tied to a dumbbell and thrown onto the second story gym roof, and the other end supported by a Buddipole mast and guyed to a stop sign. Bob, K2OID, fired up XARC's Icom 746 and easily made a CW contact with Hungary. Bob is used to operating Field Day after a couple of



hours of raising a tribander on a portable tower, but we were all impressed and a little surprised with the speed of this improvised setup and how well it worked.



The middle school kids are always fascinated by Morse code (yes, really!) so Bob told them many stories of the 340 "countries" he's worked and amazed them by translating the received dits and dahs without writing anything down. The kids got to send code with a key connected to a credit card sized Raspberry Pi computer that Steve, KA1CNF, had set up to decode CW onto the screen. He had an Arduino microcontroller sending code nearby.

Dave, KC2DQS, set up two Yaesu digital radios and was taking pictures with his camera equipped microphone and sending it to the FTM-400DR's color display. Even though these kids are used to cell phone selfies,

they all wanted to see their faces digitized and go through the air without any cell mystery in between.

While the students were having their entries judged, we gave a short presentation on the various aspects of our hobby that we brought to demo. I showed a tape measure beam and some hidden transmitters, and a video from the Wellsboro road rally. Bob showed some QSL cards and field day pictures. Charlie, KB2SOZ, talked about public service events like Tour De Cure, and hoped for a comeback of the Gananda radio club. Steve described APRS and his CW computer boards, and Dave explained his digital radios.






Although our audience was not as large as the maker faire or RMSC science and tech week, we did expose the kids and their families to ham radio. The school is planning a bigger event next year.





RARA RAGS OF THE PAST

20 YEARS AGO, JUNE, 1995

Front page news in this issue was the announcement of a new venue for the annual RARA Picnic to be held June 17th. After many years at Powder Mill Park the Board thought it might be interesting to see other locations in the Monroe County Parks system and selected the idyllic Ellison Park and its South Lodge site. The just finished May 19th Hamfest was a huge success and in a great way because of the hard work of the many volunteers needed to make it all possible. One unusual volunteer coordinator was Bob Erskine, W2NVZ, who, through his life long work as a local television engineer, made it possible to televise two way coverage of Hamfest Programs. This need arose as the meeting rooms were too small for the huge crowds interested in attending the wide variety of excellent presentations. Atlantic Division Achievement Awards were announced by Atlantic Division Director Kay Craigie, WT3P, as: Amateur of the Year Award to Kenneth Botterbrodt, WA2CVJ, the Grand Ole Ham Award to Donald Wagner, W2QFC and the Technical Achievement Award to Tim Duffy, K3LR. There were no Want Ads in this issue, but you could support RARA Rag advertisers by shopping at Glenwood Sales on Hague Street.



40 YEARS AGO, JUNE, 1975

Rochester was selected as the site of the Sisters Cities International Conference to be held at the Americana Hotel on August 6-9. To augment this international affair, RARA was activated to play an important roll in providing real time communications with like stations in sister cities. Heading the team were co-chairman Ron Jacobowski, W2HXP (K2RJ) and George Negus, K2OIU. A special callsign of WH2SCI was issued by the FCC to be used on SSB, CW, RTTY and SSTV from the lobby of the downtown hotel. Joan Vogt, WA2YTK, has been selected as chairperson of "fun and games" at the June 7th RARA picnic at Powder Mill Park. In a quiet, no frills, 1/8 page, Bruce Kelley, W2ICE, Curator of the AWA Museum, invited people to see the new AWA Museum, located "in the brick building opposite village park." (It would stay there until 2013 – Ed) The ARRL requested of the RARA Rag Editor space to print two full pages of the ARRL's Counter-Proposal to FCC Docket 20282. A number many still remember today. Out going president Joe Hood, K2YAH, like most other Presidents before him, wrote a final column as his way saying farewell. He reviewed the year past and the progress made and the goals yet to be fulfilled.. in a way that made you proud to be a RARA member. Worth reading today. From the Want Ads you could buy a Hallicrafters SX-117 from El Wagner (SK) WB2BNJ. Tire World of Greece, Ray Roberts, WA2SSU (SK) (Past President), remained a long term advertiser.


