## DISASTER COMMUNICATIONS

ANAND CHOUDRI, KC2KPG - RARA VICE PRESIDENT

Our topic for the September 2016 meeting will be "Amateur Radio in Disaster Communications: ARES-RACES-MARS, Which Service is Right for You." Ross Mazzola, KC2LOC has this to say about what he will discuss.



### So Many Choices

The hobby of amateur radio is a great one for people who want to help others. It can range from one-on-one "Elmer-ing" of other hams, to helping out with RARA functions and activities to being an instructor in one of our RARA licensing classes or perhaps even a Volunteer Examiner (VE). For those who are interested in volunteer opportunities that are more "on-the-air", there's public service.



Public service is the part of amateur radio where hams get to practice what they've learned (and have fun) while providing assistance at some type of community event. Just look at the Public Service page on the RARA website and you'll find a variety of organizations and non-profits that are looking for assistance with their communications plans. I'm a big advocate of hams being involved in Public Service because it allows us to use our equipment, protocols, professionalism and systems in ways that are very similar to what would be needed in an actual emergency situation.



Thankfully, we don't see very many major emergencies in our area but we still need to be prepared for when that day might come. For hams that are interested in volunteering their time and talents in the emergency communications services, there are three main groups to consider - Amateur Radio Emergency Service (ARES), Radio Amateur Emergency Service (RACES) and the Military Auxiliary Radio Service (MARS). But what's the difference and which one is right for you?

To kick-off the new RARA meeting year, I have the pleasure of presenting a light but informative program titled "Amateur Radio in Disaster Communications: ARES-RACES-MARS, Which Service is Right for You?" on Wednesday September 7<sup>th</sup> (remember, the meeting is on a new night!). I have been a member of ARES and RACES for over ten years and a member of U.S. Army MARS for over five years and I've got lots to share with all of you about what each of these groups does and how much time and equipment you'll need. I'll also leave time for you to ask questions about being a volunteer in emergency communications to help you choose which organization is the right one for you. Sunday September 18th, 2016

The regatta is held on the beautiful Erie Canal and finishes in the very picturesque Village of Fairport. The course is approximately 5,500 meters. A minimum of ten (10) ham operators are needed this day to provide the primary Safety Net for this water event. We, Hams, are needed aboard committee boats, rescue boats, and judge's boats during the entire event. Hams will be used at a couple of land based points as well. Food and drink will be provided.

If sufficient operators are available, we can work in shifts. The race takes a break for lunch and all the safety boats and two land point staff will return to the Fairport Crew Club Boathouse. ## Lollipop Farm: Barktober Fest Walk for the Animals

Saturday September 24th, 2016

A minimum of twelve (12) ham operators are needed for this half day Run & Walk event. Hams provide safety communications for participants by summoning EMTs as necessary via Net Control. Specific tasks include; stationary communications at way points on the run and pedestrian communications on the walk. This two-in-one event consists of a five mile run early in the morning and a one and a half mile walk late morning. The Run and Walk both start in Egypt Park (adjacent to Lollypop Farm). The run course will have operators stationed at good viewing points along the course for safety. The walk course, with over 400 people and nearly as

# ASRAS - SOLAR RADIO TELESCOPE

## RARA members take note!

The Solar Radio Telescope is a project to Study the RF emissions from Solar disturbances (Sunspots, Prominences, and CME's). It's an autonomous 2 meter dish with a sensitive receiver, tuned to the DTV band (45 – 890 Mhz.) that can track the Sun regardless of the weather (clouds, rain, snow). It is part of the Callisto solar network, and is a combined project from ASRAS, RIT and U of R.




Last year we successfully demonstrated this concept at the RIT Imagine festival in May.



This year we showed a 'proof of concept model' of Sun signals with local EMI interference (DTV channels 8, 10 & 13), and showed a method of removing the interference mathematically (below), that works with 'fixed location emitters'. The green & red traces are Solar RT signals (green - w a low noise amplifier, red - without amplifier).

The blue trace is the local interference (DTV, radio, etc.). Note the channel 8 TV signal (~ 657 Mhz) removed from the 'processed' signal (Blue arrow – below).



Our plan for the 2016 -17 school year is to refine this rough concept, and get the system operational and on-line. Plans call for an internet data link for our data to be sent to Zurich, SZ. This will enable global helio-scientists to better predict the impact of solar storms on Earth. We'll be the only station on the eastern seaboard, north of the equator.

## A RARE LITTLE FIND AT BATAVIA

If you were born fifteen years before 1982 and were active as a ham by that time, you might remember a cute little QST rig, a 10-watt wonder assembled by Doug DeMaw (W1FB/SK), scion of the QRP world for so many years.

So here I was, on my last cruise through the Batavia Hamfest; sellers were thinning out - the grand prize had just been announced.

I went back down the line and stopped at the table with that old QRP rig I had spied about 8:30. Would the seller take a lower price? Pause. Yes. So I had my one hamfest "rig" purchase of the day. The seller said something about the preamp. He was the thoughtful sort, who brought along all the paperwork for this homebrew item.

In general, the rig was in good shape. I brought it home, and over the past five days I've brought it to *better* life. I've made one QSO (Minnesota) so far, and I tried unsuccessfully for a contact with R1FF (St. Petersburg Russia).

The preamp wasn't working for two reasons. First, the DPDT switch to activate the preamp was faulty. There was an open circuit when switched to "preamp." (This rig really needs the preamp.) I bought a TPDT switch to bring over the 12 volts for the preamp and switch that on as well, according to the schematic. As it was, the preamp had always been "on," being wired to the 12 volt buss.

The other major problem was with the preamp itself. I could not get it to peak. The input T1 tank circuit (from the antenna) has a 5-25 pfd trimmer; the schematic called for 30 pfd. A bit low, I thought, so I added 22 pfd in parallel, to swing it higher. I did this after I tried to peak an injected signal. The touch of a small metal screwdriver to the trimmer cap suddenly made the preamp "come alive." "Aha," I thought. It does need more capacitance. I added 22 pfd to the underside of the PC board. At the same time I added 22 pfd to the toroid "L" in the output to give a boost to both input and output. Then, I put it all back together and powered up.



No luck. I decided that there must be a problem with the winding of the transformer on the toroid at the preamp input. I assured myself that it was properly wired. But had the 20's-some gauge wire been sufficiently cleaned before being soldered to the board? So I decided to remove it, rewind and try again. Cover all bases, I say.

As I looked closely underneath the PC board to work out my mini plan of action, I spied an ever-so-small solder bridge from the input pad for the coax from the antenna. That will do it!, I said to myself, even if there could be a still bigger problem I have yet to discover.

THIS bridge had to go. I left the padding caps I had installed; "try it with my improvement," I thought. I put everything back together and powered up the rig.

Now there was life in the preamp! I easily peaked both the transformer (T) and the inductor (L), and now the receiver is

hot. That screwdriver touching the trimmer and my hand had provided enough capacitance in the circuit and a "wireless" connection to the nearby antenna coax to make me think the circuits simply needed more capacitance. "Never trust RF and certainly not a previous solder job," are my mottos.



With 10 watts output, I made a crazy-easy contact into Minnesota - the first QSO with this rig in possibly 35 years! Sam, the very loud R1KK in St. Petersburg was another matter. He was 599 in QSB, but the Germans were getting all the attention. No luck for me this time. I'll try again tonight.

The radio is a 1982 vintage schematic mix-n-match by Doug DeMaw (W1FB/SK) and was showcased in two articles in the 1982 QST Magazine. This is not a transceiver, but a transmitter-receiver combo that uses two VXO's (variable crystal oscillators) that vary the frequencies. A spotting push-button connection on the front panel permits a centering of the transmit frequency onto the received signal (i.e., split frequency QSO's are possible!). The receiver uses a 17.6 MHz crystal in a superhet architecture to permit about 30 KHz of receive coverage from the bottom of the CW portion on 20 meters. The radio's 14.025 crystal in the transmitter circuit gives me about 19 KHz wiggle room for QSO's. The hang-

time on key-up is up to one second, which HAS to be changed. To do this, one simply reduces the electrolytic in the TR switch down from 10 mfd. If I wanted *true* break-in keying, I would eliminate the capacitor and install reed relays. Not going to go that far. It's a historical piece, after all.

I cleaned up some other wiring, rerouted and replaced some 12 volt lines with red wire. Otherwise, everything else is the same. I just may add more heat-sink to the two Motorola MRF 476's, but my Hammerlund HQ-129X - an AWA Auction purchase - is calling me, and I need to re-populate it with caps and resistors to make it its new December 1945 self again.

## 20 YEARS AGO, SEPTEMBER, 1996

As we start reporting another RARA season of regular monthly happenings we'll begin with our new officers and Board. At President we find Art DeBruycker W2YGW ably assisted by VP George Lloyd N2UIO. Tom Lange N2VSM records the happenings as Secretary and money matters are handled by Treasurer Richard Goslee K2VCZ. You elected the following members to the Board of Directors: Lloyd Caves WB2EFU, Neal Eckhardt WB2EKP, Keith Freeberg N2BEL, Dave Hassett K2SQI, Ed Holdsworth N2EH, Chris Reich WB2DYJ and Jack Tripp N2SNL. In normal fashion each of the above RARA leaders had their telephone numbers published so that members could easily contact them. This year there were funny tags with some of them with an "@" symbol in the wording. Yes, e-mail has arrived. In his first writing as program chairman, George Lloyd N2UIO, introduced the first program with presenters Chris Shalvoy N2PEB, Fred Gern KB2SE and Ed Gable K2MP. The topic was DX'ing and the art of QSL'ing. In an effort to put RARA in the lime light of all Rochester area Radio Amateurs, it was the practice to mail the September Rag to every ham listed in the RARA Directory regardless of membership status. As such, this issue was very large with representatives from each local ham radio club writing to entice new interest and membership. The list is too large to review in detail but let's recognize those authors who publicized your club. Lloyd Caves, WB2EFU, wrote on RARA and Public Service. "The Prez Says" by Art DeBruycker, W2YGW, introduced RARA in general. George Platteter, AA2FO, wrote on Licensing Classes. Ev Tupis, WB2ELB, wrote for the VHF Club while Chris Shalvoy, N2PEB, did the same for the RDXA. J.H. McMullin, N2MXG, introduced the RRRA and the Rochester Area Packet Society (RAPS) was made known by Jack Tripp, N2SNL. Ed Gable, K2MP, wrote to introduce the ARRL Awards program, the activities of the Antique Wireless Association and his usual "Years Ago" articles. With regret it was reported that Charles Kolz, N2VDM, was reported as a Silent Key. From the Want Ads you could buy a direct coupled CES Touch Tone pad from Irv Goodman, AF2K. Snyder and Snyder Attorneys at Law (Sherwood W2KFU) remained a long term advertiser.

## 40 YEARS AGO, SEPTEMBER, 1976

Starting their new year in 1976 were officers Jim Collinsworth WB2EDT (N2EH) as President, Ed Gable W2MPM (K2MP) as Vice-President, Alan Komenski WB2ZFM (AC2K) as Secretary and Len Gessin WA2ZNC (Same call!) as Treasurer. On the Board were Otto WB2RJB, Bob W2NVZ, Ed WA2EKR (N2EH), Ron W2HXP (K2RJ), Bill WA2CER, Harold WA2KND (K2HC) and Ralph (Bud) Young WA2UGE. Program Chmn Ed Gable, W2MPM, introduced Bob Nezelek, W2CNS, who reported on his successful VHF/UHF DXpedition to West Virginia as W2CNS/8. Operating 50 through 1296 MHz, the team worked 96 ARRL Sections during the June VHF QSO Party. Bruce Kelley, W2ICE (sk) wrote an interesting article describing his Elmer, Perry Esten, W8BOX (W2PN, 5Z4PN, XDJ0PN, KR6PN... more) and his first 201A two watt transmitter. Dwight Hill, K2KWK, revealed his weekly 2 meter FM Official Bulletin Station operating alternately between the .79 and .88 repeaters. Recent RARA activities included a station set up at the Monroe County Fair, Communications for a balloon race and a road rally and RARA's June Picnic. From the Want Ads you could buy a Swan 6 meter SSB transceiver from Len, WA2ZNC. CQ, The Radio Amateur's Journal, remained a long term advertiser.

In September (and October), we will bend the rule to cause the first meeting to be held on the second Friday, September 10. Remember, we meet on the second Friday, September 10.


The change was made because of Labor Day weekend holidays.




