RARA AND SENECA WATERWAYS HOST RADIO MERIT BADGE CLASS

Pittsford, New York. RARA uses the headquarters building of Seneca Waterways Boy Scout Council for its meetings, so when Dave Cheney, the Council Program Director, asked if RARA could produce a radio merit badge class, the board responded: "Yes." Twenty Scouts earned the radio merit badge on Saturday, April 29, from 0900 until 1500.

The class was originally scheduled for the headquarters building, but it was already booked for the original date, and the alternate date. Fortunately, the First Presbyterian Church of Pittsford offered its spaces for two classes and a radio room, as well as fox hunting on the grounds outside.



On Friday, Tim Brown set up a dipole antenna outside to support HF communications. He tested the bands with SSB mode, but made no contacts. When he switched to CW, however, he made a contact right away with a station calling CQ DX from France. "Great," he said, "now we know we can work DX." Saturday's band conditions, however, required an alternate plan. Also in the radio room on Saturday was Stephen Fell, with his all band, all mode radio, and Jon Dickason, with his KX-3 as well as his fox hunting equipment.

Mike Moore and Brian O'Connor were the instructors, each with a good-size group of Scouts. Eighteen Scouts preregistered, some from Buffalo, and 20 showed up for the merit badge. Tim Guyot assisted with fox hunting, mixing lemonade, obtaining ice, monitoring the halls, and recording the boys' accomplishments on the master roster.

The HF bands were poor on Saturday. One Scout checked into a net in central Virginia on 40 meters, but after that, we couldn't raise anyone on that band, or 20 meters (the two bands the dipole supported). We turned to Mike Rink's WR2ROC repeater at 146.790, IRLP 4252, linked to a station in Florida, for some DX communications. Several of the Scouts talked to the friendly voice in Mayport, a former Scout, who mentioned the 94 degree temperature there. In all, each Scout was able to meet the requirement for making a radio QSO.



Jon conducted four groups of fox hunters using directional Yagi antennas, and the body shield method to find the fox, which transmitted Jon's call sign every minute. Though it was a cool day, the boys liked getting outside and hunting and were able to follow Jon's instructions on how to use the radios to find the transmitter.

Council provided four sheet pizzas from Mark's (a big Scouting supporter), most of which disappeared in 30 minutes. Perhaps it was because the delivery address given to the driver was in Henrietta, so he had to be turned around and delivered in Pittsford about 45 minutes late.

Working with the youth in Scouting is beneficial to them, and to RARA. We get to advance interest in radio communications, especially HAM radio, and the youth benefit from the years of experience and education of our teaching members.


We made our base of operation the RDXA tent. I apologize for not taking a picture of the RDXA tent.

The XRZ Amateur Radio Club held their spring Fox Hunt on Saturday May 17th. The skies looked as if it might rain at any minute, but only a couple of short sprinkles were felt. Five teams took part in the hunt, with the only solo effort this time being Chris KC2VCK.

Four 2 meter FM transmitters were hidden for this hunt. Fox #1 was located off a trail in Gosnells Woods near Vosberg Road in West Webster. It was at the top of a ridge and surrounded by some deep gulleys and ended up being quite a challenge, even for experienced hunters. Fox #2 was running a bit more power, and was not too far away at Irondequoit Bay Marine Park. This site was not that difficult, but the route coming from the other side of the bay is a bit roundabout. So to speak. Fox #3 was on a hill off Orchard Park Blvd in Irondequoit Bay Park West. Fox #4 was at the southern end of the bay, just a couple hundred yards into Lucien Morin Park, and conveniently located by McGregors.



My first exposure to Amateur radio was a visit with my uncle W2COJ on Hampton Blvd. in Greece. I don't know if he was a member of the local DX group but I suspect he was. He was employed at the RG&E BeeBee station.

He died in 1949 so I had to be less than 7 years old when I visited him. I recall the shack out behind the house which was a converted chicken coop. Of course the glowing tubes, lights and sounds made a lasting impression. I don't recall any Yagi antennas or towers, just wire antennas strung across the yard but I do remember seeing the open wire ladder line.

I came across this article in the newspaper archives where he worked the Byrd Expedition in the Antarctic on 20 meter CW in March 1940. I wondered what the conditions were like then and found the sunspot activity was so great it wiped out communications a few weeks after his QSO. The aurora was so bright in New Jersey that people thought the town was on fire. I am a bit surprised the noise level didn't make the contact impossible.

Dale's son, Dale Jr was N2OTC, his daughter is WA2KIS and his grandson is N2LWY. Must be in the genes...



March 1940 The first reported incidences of power grid problems due to solar activity occurred all across the Northeast, from Pennsylvania through New England, and in Minnesota, Ontario, and Quebec. At the same time, nearly all overseas radio telephones and long-distance land telephones failed for a number of days.

SUMMARY OF MOUNT WILSON MAGNETIC OBSERVATIONS OF SUNSPOTS FOR MARCH AND APRIL, 1940

The mean number of spot-groups observed daily in March and April was greater than in any month from October 1939 to March 1940.

Group No. 6725,¹ which developed into a very large group early in January 1940, was observed from December 31, 1939, to April 22, 1940, an interval of 114 days. Whether it was still present after April 22 is not known, since clouds prevented solar observations at Mount Wilson from April 22 to 27. On its fourth appearance in March, a large active group, No. 6783 (Plate XV), preceded it by 10°.

This active group was associated with intense magnetic activity from March 23 to April 3, described on page 169 of these *Publications*. The only other magnetic activity in March and April was a moderate storm on April 25-26. On April 25 the large group of March, which had returned as No. 6814, was 40° (3 days) west of the central meridian.

Further it was reported that Gerald Gavin, NU3D was given the "Grand Ole Ham" award along with Ron Raposo, N2JAW, who received the "Technical Achievement" award. With thanks to NYS ARRL Public Information Officer Stephan Anderman, WA3RKB, who made the arrangements, Governor George Pataki proclaimed the month of June as Amateur Radio Month in the Empire State. In June 1996, he was the Foundation for Amateur Radio's "Ham of the Month."

Joe is always ready to help fellow Amateurs solve technical problems, install antennas and station equipment, and fix anything that's broken. He simply loves working with radios, and no problem is too difficult or too much bother for him to trouble-shoot.

Joe has developed a special course of electronic instruction for children. His basic electricity course for the fourth grade at Holy Trinity Episcopal Day School in Bowie, MD, makes learning electronics fun. He has constructed demonstration devices that give the kids hands-on experience with the principles they're learning. Who knows how many of these children will someday become hams and enter careers in electronics because Joe donated his time and effort to teaching them? Florida Trip Planned -- Next Winter

One of the very best things about living in our part of the world is our ability to leave the frigid weather behind in February and take a vacation in the warm Southland.

Although it may be warm and comfortable now, you can be assured that another winter will be upon us sooner than we wish.

On the weekend of February 16 through 19, 1978, you will be able to get away from the cold Northland and spend an extended weekend in Orlando and Disney World. You'll even be able to attend the annual Orlando Hamfest, held that weekend.

Plans are being drawn up now to form a four group of RaRa members and their friends. We will fly from Rochester to Orlando on the morning of Thursday, February 16. Return to Rochester is on Sunday evening, February 19. The three night stay in Orlando will be at the Sheraton Twin Towers site of the Hamfest. Also included will be a day at Disney World and/or the Kennedy Space Center. A car rental will also be included. IF - we get at least 40 to make the tour, we can get a special price of approximately \$250 per person. The price includes the air fare, hotel, car rental, and admission to Disney World. To accommodate a group our size, we must have space reserved by Labor Day.


