NOTES FOR RVs / CAMPERS

1. Arrival – No earlier than 6:00 PM on Friday June 3, 2022. Please see a volunteer or the on-site security guard for specific parking instructions.
2. Departure – No later than 3:30 PM on Saturday June 4, 2022.
3. There is no overnight fee. RVs that arrive on Friday will be charged for their attendees (\$7/person) on Saturday morning.
4. There are no utilities (water/electric/waste) available. Please minimize generator use at night as the venue backs up to a neighborhood. Porta-Potties are available on site.
5. Antennas are permitted (reasonable size).

ADMISSION

2021 RARA EDUCATIONAL GRANT PRESENTATION

RARA will formally present its 2021 Education and Technology Grant to the Antique Wireless Association (AWA) at the 2022 Rochester Hamfest. RARA established the grant to provide funding for educational projects and specific equipment needs that promote practical applications in the STEM fields of electronics and radio communications with an emphasis on youth-based activities.

The AWA, with its museum located in East Bloomfield and international membership, is well known to many RARA members. It is chartered as a non-profit educational organization. AWA sought funding under the RARA Education and Technology Grant to extend their Radio Fab Lab (RFL) program in a way that will further their mission element to “develop educational programs and opportunities for all ages”.

This grant will fund the purchase of a trailer that will be used to extend the AWA Radio Fab Lab program and provide on-site sessions at area schools. LICENSE EXAMS

We will have exams for two hours, from 9:00AM to 11:00AM Saturday June 4th.

You must have an FCC Registration Number (FRN), the FCC is no longer accepting SSNs for this purpose. If you don't have one, you can go here <https://apps.fcc.gov/coresWeb/regEntityType.do>

What you need to know:

- **Pre-Registration is highly recommended.** Please make it easier for our volunteers by signing up at <https://hamstudy.org/sessions/62162f49b94ed86bbe7b4676/1>
- **Mask, pen, picture ID required.** Pencil and calculator (optional), but they will NOT be supplied.
- **RARA and Laurel VEC do not charge anything** to administer, process, or file your exams. However, as of April 19th, the FCC will charge a \$35 fee for new licenses. The information about this fee is e-mailed by the FCC once the paperwork is filed and is NOT collected at the exam. More info from the ARRL on this <https://www.arrl.org/fcc-application-fee>
- **The FCC requires an e-mail address.** This is usually shared with RARA, but the examiners will not share this information if you request it be withheld.
- If you are ONLY attending for an exam and not the rest of the hamfest, there is no entry fee. Let someone at the entrance know and they'll escort you to the exam room.

A HEAD START ON ARRL AWARD APPLICATION AT THE ROCHESTER HAMFEST

On June 1st, area Amateurs will once again be gifted by having their superb Amateur Radio Club providing a great service to their membership, the **Rochester Hamfest**, sponsored by RARA. Hamfest details will be found in recent RARA Rags as well as the special Hamfest Edition of the Rag, so I will not go into particulars here. A feature of the hamfest is that your applications for DXCC, WAS, and VUCC awards can be checked right on site Saturday morning, inside the Firemen's Exempt Building. My purpose here is to assist area Amateurs wishing to apply for such awards to get a head start on the process.

There are 3 ways to apply for ARRL awards: **Note: 160 meter cards are allowed**

1. Logbook of The World (LoTW)
2. The Online DXCC Application
3. Traditional paper cards
(Submitted to DXCC directly or approved by a card checker)

The hybrid application submission (paper cards combined with Logbook of the World) has been discontinued. Each submission is now a separate application with separate fees for each one.

By far a 100% LoTW application is the most convenient and least expensive DXCC, WAS and VUCC application as it can be processed entirely by the applicant without paper QSL card approvals. As this paper is written to help those needing paper QSL's approved at the Rochester Hamfest, I will only provide LoTW general information here. You must go to the ARRL website to set up your personal LoTW account as described below.

WHAT IS LOGBOOK OF THE WORLD?

LoTW is a secure, central repository of logs from ham operators around the world. One of the main features is it will allow DXCC, WAS and VUCC program participants to claim credit without the need for having a QSL card in hand. On-line applications for WAS and VUCC also need a LoTW account set up and links run between your WAS and VUCC Award data sections. After setting up those links the processing of award applications is easy and the most cost effective way of obtaining ARRL sponsored awards.

ONLINE DXCC APPLICATION

The ARRL's new Online Award tool is used to accept applications, allowing hams to supply the data from traditional paper QSLs in a digital form to apply for a new DXCC award or endorsement. Application using Online DXCC is easier than making a paper application, saving both time and money.

Using the Online DXCC Application, the user can select the cards that he or she would like to have checked by a card checker and, at his or her convenience, type that data into a form (which can be saved and retrieved at any time until submitted) and make an application for DXCC. When the application is finished, the participant will be able to print the list of cards and take the list and the cards (in the same order that they are entered into the form) to a card checker who will check the cards, note any changes and send the form to ARRL HQ. The card checker's job is exactly the same as before, except he or she does not need to collect a payment (unless the participant has worked that out with the card checker), as the

client can pay online. Once submitted, DXCC staff can access the file submitted by the client, quickly make any changes noted by the card checker and process the application. The Online DXCC Application will have rates that are half those of a traditional paper QSL application that is sent to ARRL HQ.

Advantages of submitting your DXCC application using Online DXCC include:

Cost: The application fees are lower when submitting a DXCC application through Online DXCC. In particular, the application fee and the extra QSO fee for Online DXCC are half those of a traditional paper application.

Accuracy: Making a DXCC submission with Online DXCC is more accurate than a paper application that is filled out by hand because typographical errors are eliminated (except for the call sign). There will be no data entry errors at ARRL HQ because the contents of an Online DXCC application are transmitted directly to the DXCC system at HQ.

Speed: Making a DXCC submission using Online DXCC speeds up the processing of an application because the information on the DXCC Award Application and the DXCC Record Sheet do not have to be manually entered into the DXCC system by ARRL HQ staff. The more applicants who use this system means there is a smaller backlog of applications and a faster turnaround for all DXCC program participants.

Convenience: The Online DXCC system will save the entered QSL card and application information for future access. You may enter information from your QSLs as you receive them and then submit your cards for checking when you are ready to apply for a DXCC award or endorsement. Cards no longer need to be in band or mode order.

Keep in mind that QSL cards will still need to be checked if you use the Online DXCC Application, either by a DXCC Card Checker or sent to ARRL HQ for checking.

Be sure to pay **CLOSE** attention to your data entry. Check each entry to be sure you have entered the correct callsign, accurate date, band and mode and that you have selected the correct entity. Data mismatches will almost always cause a problem and may result in a QSO being rejected.

After completing your online DXCC, WAS, VUCC application, you may bring your cards and forms to a local ARRL card checker: **Ed Gable K2MP**, Hilton, NY, (585) 392-3088, or send in the paperwork and cards to the ARRL DXCC Desk, or best yet come to the **Rochester Hamfest on June 1st** for a real hands-on experience. Ed will be set up inside the Firemen's Exempt Building. 160 meter cards can be checked.

If mailing cards to ARRL, package the cards securely, protect the cards from moisture, and use a trackable shipping method.

DO I NEED AN APPLICATION FORM WITH EACH SUBMISSION?

Yes. The DXCC application form tells us what you are applying for and provides us with your current mailing address. The current application forms are always available free from the Awards portion of the ARRL website. Complete all sections including: what you are applying for (endorsements, new certificates, etc.), your personal information, the return address information, fees section, telephone number and e-mail, the number of cards and QSOs included.

ARRL membership is required for DXCC applicants in the US, its possessions, and Puerto Rico.

WHAT DO "NEW" AND "ENDORSEMENT" MEAN ON THE APPLICATION?

This part of the application form tells DXCC staff whether you are applying for a new award (certificate) or an endorsement (building totals on existing award(s)).

NEW indicates that a certificate is expected from the submission. More than one **NEW** award (certificate) can be applied for on a single application.

ENDORSEMENT indicates that an applicant is building credits on an existing award or awards. Please do not use **ENDORSEMENT** if you do not have an award on the bands or modes. If you are building totals towards future awards, leave this blank.

HOW CAN I VERIFY THAT MY APPLICATION HAS BEEN RECEIVED AT HQ?

Applications logged into the DXCC computer system are listed on the DXCC Applications Received page. Call signs are listed alpha-numerically. Next to the call sign is the date the application was logged into the DXCC computer. The date noted may not be the date the application was received by ARRL; it only reflects the date that it was logged into the DXCC computer.

TRADITIONAL PAPER APPLICATION INSTRUCTIONS

If you do not use LogBook of the World (LoTW) or the new Online DXCC application system you are still welcome to use the old traditional paper application procedure. Two forms are required with each submission:

The first needed form is the Application Form

When filling out the Application form be sure to read it thoroughly and fill in all places where it asks for information. All information on the form is strictly confidential and usually within a few months of completion of the application the forms are shredded. Forms with credit card data noted on them are shredded quicker.

Before getting started be sure the cards you are submitting are new and not duplicates. (After 101 QSOs there is a fee of \$0.15 per QSO so sorting out any dupes will save you some money and for DXCC staff unnecessary processing time).

The second needed form is the Record Sheet

On the Record Sheet Your cards *MUST* be sorted in the following order:

1. Band: 80 mtr, then 40 mtr, then 20 mtr, etc.
2. Mode within each band; 80 SSB, then 80 CW, then 40 SSB, then 40 Data, then 20 SSB, and the like matching your QSL information.
3. Cards with more than one QSO (multiples) keep together at the end. There is no specific sort order for multiples.

Once sorted, list the cards on the record sheet in exactly the same order in which they were sorted.

Note: Do not sort card(s) by callsign or by entity (country) name.

Sorting and listing your cards according to these rules helps streamline the data entry process.

Once you have sorted the cards print the record sheet and begin logging them. Check your entries very carefully to make sure the information you transferred from the card to the record sheet is 100% accurate. Go slowly and pay attention to detail. If you do not check entries carefully and problems develop, this could cause errors in processing or even cause a card to be rejected.

If you have generated a record sheet from a personal program other than the one attached here, it is OK to use your personal version, however, it must match the DXCC version exactly without any extraneous data or fields (eg: prefix, RST etc). Personally, produced forms not matching the DXCC version exactly may be refused. When using non-DXCC versions also be sure that the date field matches the DXCC version, exactly.

The correct format is:
day/month/year or dd/mm/yyyy.

After all of your paperwork has been generated you are ready to submit the application directly to ARRL HQ Award desk or via a field check point.

Payment for DXCC applications is due at the time of the submission. After we complete the charges, your credit card information is destroyed for privacy reasons

PRICING TO SELL (IN THE FLEA MARKET)

There are two goals when it comes to Flea Market success:

- Making it easy for buyers to know what you brought.
- Going home without it.



Here is a guide for doing both, effectively!

First...

... research the market-worth of the item you wish to sell. An easy way is to check e-Bay...but NOT for the reason that you think.

Items on e-Bay that are unsold are OVERPRICED. Those that sell did so because they have a national audience. If you want to sell at the RARA Rochester Hamfest, consider a price that is NO HIGHER than 70% of those found on e-Bay as your ASKING price...knowing that you WILL be asked to take something less (and be prepared to!).

This is not a reflection on your value. It is a reflection on the markets' value. You brought it to the Flea Market to sell...not to go home with. Selling early lets you scour the market for a deal of your own to go home with!

Second...

... label your asking price for your items, individually. A sign that says "Make Offer" without an asking price really means "I don't want to sell it".

Third...

... along with being prepared with an asking price, attach a 3x5 card with a few short bullets about the items' specifications. No more than 3 bullets. People are walking-by. Most won't take the time to read a paragraph.

Fourth...

... be ready to talk about what you have. Those bulleted lists will simply start conversations. After that, it is up to you to make it easy to go home without it (the reason you came!).

In conclusion, as you prepare to sell in the Flea Market try to remember that you are there to "go home without it". Your connection to the item has already been paid for by the years of great service that the item has already given to you. You are giving the next owner the opportunity to start building their own memories. Set a price that will allow them to start doing so right away!



BUY AND SELL AT THE COUNTRY STORE

Consignments -- We sell your stuff for you !

Country Store consignments are available to both members and non-members.

Complete the Country Store Item Description form before you arrive.

We will do our best to represent your item/s to potential buyers. But the Country Store Staff won't haggle with a customer. If someone has a good question we can't answer, we'll try to contact you via your paperwork info. Bring your HT or Cell Phone for contacts.

THE HISTORY OF ROCHESTER HAMFESTS

Rochester area Amateur Radio Operators, and indeed those reaching the far corners of the Northeast United States and beyond, have been blessed with having in their back yard a wonderful Hamfest to serve their needs for some eighty-nine years. The first recorded hamfest was brought by the Radio Club of Rochester (1921-1931) on August 5, 1927, and except for the war years and a burp in 2014, has been an annual event ever since.


It should be noted that Hamfests of the late twenties and through the thirties were much different affairs than one is used to today. Indeed there were no floor displays by vendors, nor were there flea markets and seminars. This is because the venues tended to be formal places such as the ballrooms of the Sagamore, Powers and Seneca hotels, The Elks Club and even a formal meeting hall at the Central Rochester Y.M.C.A. The dress was strictly suit and tie and dresses for the ladies. There was good fellowship, great meals with the obligatory guest speaker and if lucky you might win a door prize, perhaps a vacuum tube from Rochester Radio Supply.

I mentioned the lack of hamfests during the war years of WW2, but that didn't mean there were no gatherings; they were just much more informal and often consisted of good natured bowling ball tournaments between VHF men and DX'ers at the Ledarkrantz Club. The last of these pre-war style hamfests was in 1953, at the Elks Club in Rochester. It was there that organizers realized they were running out of room for the expanding popularity of the events and the need for room to expand into additional activities. Enter the era of the Doud Post.

In 1954, Hamfest Chairman Bruce Kelley, W2ICE, took the move to expand and found a very workable venue in the American Legion Doud Post on Buffalo Road. It had lots of parking, plenty of display and conference rooms as well as a nice banquet hall. The change in venue also brought a name change to "The Western New York Hamfest." It also had a price tag where a full day's event could be had for a ticket costing just \$3.75. That location turned out to be the right

place at the right time and the Hamfest just grew and grew over the ten years it was held there.

One very interesting historical fact; in 1954, Chairman Kelley was chatting with some attendees when the VHF program Chairman, Hank Blodgett, W2UTH, came running in and excitedly said "Bruce, Bruce... there's someone outside in the parking lot selling stuff out the back of his car." "What kind of stuff" Bruce asked. "Just some old ham gear and parts," replied Hank. "Sounds like a clever idea," Bruce exclaimed, "we'll allow that." And that, gentle readers, was the start of Hamfest Flea Marketing, right here in Rochester, New York.

Success brought the need to change again as the Doud Post became too small to handle larger crowds and in 1964, the WNY Hamfest moved to Vince's 50 Acres on Route 15, south of Rochester. This proved to be an OK spot although many felt it wasn't a Rochester event being so far out of town and it wasn't a very large parking lot for what was becoming a very important Flea Market area.

Toward the end of the six year stay at Bristol 50 Acres (formerly Vince's 50 Acres) a few important events took place. The most important and impacting was the entry of a gentleman small in stature but big in ideas and the ability to get things done; Mr. Harold Smith, WA2KND (K2HC). Harold would become the most tireless, the hardest working and the most successful Hamfest General Chairman for the next 40 years.

Another change, recognizing the movement in ham radio interests, was again changing the name to "The Western New York Hamfest and VHF Conference." Bruce Kelley, W2ICE, didn't go away; he gravitated to what he learned to do very well during his twelve years as head of the Antique Wireless Association, and that was how to gather important people to join the hamfest roster. Try these names that Bruce brought in for size; Bill Halligan, W9AC, founder/President of Hallicrafters, Ed Tilton, Editor, QST, (sitting with) Wayne Green, W2NSD, Managing Editor CQ Magazine, Sam Harris, W1FZJ, of Moon Bounce fame, Katachi Nose, KH6IJ, of DX fame and many more.

1970, saw the last Hamfest at Bristol 50 Acres. Behind the scenes Harold Smith was urging the old committee to do it right and make a permanent move. That commitment concluded with Harold signing a contract with the Monroe County Fairgrounds and Dome Arena for the 1971, Western New York Hamfest and VHF Conference, the start of something BIG, very BIG, that would continue for thirty-seven years!

Big ideas, a large venue and much financial success fostered growth. Hamfest planning brought two day and then three day Hamfests in the early seventies. Larger attendance, in the thousands, created interest by both national and international vendors as well as dignitaries eager to add having been part of the Rochester Hamfest to their Resumes. This writer remembers well, when deciding to upgrade to a high end SSB transceiver, finding the best of Kenwood, ICOM and Yaesu not only on display but operating with an invite to twiddle the knobs. Where else could a farm boy from Hilton find such a thing other than a trip to Dayton?

Large attendance also caught the eye of ARRL officials in Newington. During the peak period of the Rochester Hamfest dynasty, the ARRL Headquarters might just as well have locked their doors as all the officials were in Rochester. They loved it here and were eager to put on programs by League staffers and ARRL Forums by officers and Atlantic Division Directors and Western New York officials.

The early eighties brought another name change: "The Rochester Hamfest combined with the Atlantic Division and New York State ARRL Convention." We

just knew it as the Rochester Hamfest.

A Notable event happened in 1975, when John Schooly, W2BLU, took on the difficult task of convincing the FCC that they should get out of their Buffalo offices and come to Rochester to give exams. With red tape finally torn aside, John was successful and for the first time, and way before VE programs, the FCC came to the Rochester Hamfest and under the eagle eye of FCC examiners, performed code and theory exams. That's how this Hilton farm boy went from W2MPM to K2MP. Where else but the Rochester Hamfest? Are you getting the idea of what a wonderful service a good Hamfest is to the local Amateur Radio community?

But then there was the year that success caught the eye of one not too friendly when in 1981, the NYS Sales tax folks paid a visit to the crowded and very busy Flea Market. They were looking for seller's sales tax documents and looking to see if NYS tax was being collected. The result was effectively closing the Flea Market. Conferences with the tax department concluded they overstated the need for documents and that the once a year Flea Market should have been treated as a casual sale, not unlike a garage sale. But the damage was done and it took a couple of years to fully recover. In 1982, the Hamfest Brochure was complete with a Sales Tax warning that all participants were responsible for their own activities.

Then, as now, the Hamfest was an all volunteer organization with participation by RARA Members. Notable were the hard working and proud wearers of their badge of honor saying they were a "Holdsworth Coolie." Think of this. The Thursday before a Friday opening Holdsworth Coolies, under the direction of Ed Holdsworth, N2EH, arrived at the Dome Arena to find a large cavernous empty building that in only hours had to be converted into a massive display area ready for vendors to move into. N2EH would give directions to groups moving tables, installing drapes, marking floors and it just got done. Oh, yeh, they got lunch.

For year after year the Hamfest served its customers, the Amateurs of the area, very well. In the Y2K era things began to change and once started events happened quickly. The most notable, in my mind, is how we disseminated information and purchased our wares. If we wanted to learn the latest DX news, or how to connect our Packet TNC, we just jumped on the world-wide web and got an immediate response. There was less and less a need to attend a Hamfest Seminar.

Of bigger impact was how we purchased our ham gear. Touch and feel was great, but so much information and reports of user experience was easily obtained on the web. Then, too, if you bought an expensive transceiver from a hamfest vendor you had to pay sales tax. Buy it on-line from many new and competitive sources could and did save a lot of money. Vendors, seeing the handwriting on the wall, stopped expensive hamfest selling in a very short amount of time. During that time the Dome Arena became less and less occupied by desirable ham vendors and we saw smaller vendors selling everything from table lamps to VHS tapes just to fill empty spots.

Then, too, the profile of a Hamfest attendee was changing with the times. People were less interested in a Banquet type of event with sit down dinners, distribution of awards and guest speakers, even good ones. And those events were expensive and toward the end were not profitable, although that was not necessarily a goal as long as the entire event stayed in the black. Toward the end of the Dome arena era it was the Flea Market that was the draw but that could not sustain the cost of the Fairground and Conference Hotel.

In 2007, the Fairgrounds underwent a complete renovation and Chairman Harold Smith, K2HC, thought an all indoor flea market in the renovated and air conditioned Minot Hall would be an answer to declining attendance. Flea Market Chairman Peter Fournia, W2SKY, did a good job of laying out Flea Market spots both indoors and outdoors, but the outdoor venue proved most desirable over the thirty dollar indoor spots. In 2008, Assistant Hamfest Chairman Richard Goslee, KG2I, helping to oversee a reduced two day event, saw the last Rochester Hamfest to be held at the Dome Arena.

Enter the Barnard Fireman's Field era. 2009 brought a new venue and a new name, now "The RARA Hamfest and Technology Expo and Atlantic Division Convention." We all knew it as the Rochester Hamfest. The 'fest was cut way back occupying one day with minimal programming and involvement by ARRL folks despite the Convention title. The Flea Market dominated the day and attendees seemed pleased. This format seemed acceptable to Chairman Len Crellin, KC2PCD, and for the next two years, 2010 and 2011, the schedule of events and venue remained the same except for dropping "Atlantic Division Convention" from the name.

2012 brought another new venue for the Hamfest and that was at the Rochester Institute of Technology's Field House providing both indoor and outdoor facilities. The planned indoor Flea Market was lacking execution and most people were just as happy with the outdoor, paved, parking lot. Lessons learned that first year could have resulted in better venue utilization, but RIT's graduation scheduling prevented further access. 2013 brought "Ham-o-Rama 2013" back to RIT and a remote parking lot with an outdoor Flea Market only format. If you only wanted a good flea market this worked for you. If not, you had to go out of state to find anything but a Flea Market centered event with VE testing.

A common and ever increasing theme by organizers over the years has been that they need help in producing these Hamfests. You could talk for days on why the customs of people have changed over the years and why volunteerism

is declining everywhere, but the truth remains it just is. In 2014, RARA had to conclude and announce to the world that there would be no 2014 Rochester Hamfest for the simple reason there was no committee to plan and run it.

Better news followed the next year when RARA President Frank Schramm, WB2PYD, announced there would be a Rochester Hamfest. The event was back at the Barnard Fireman's Field and for attendees, despite the rain, seemed like a good event and the Flea Market only activity seemed to meet current thinking and needs of the customer. What attendees could not see was the trouble brewing between RARA and the Barnard Executives. Subsequent negotiations for a 2016, use of the facilities completely broke down and RARA was forced to look elsewhere.

Stepping up to the plate was Ev Tupis, W2EV, who formed a Hamfest Committee as Chairman and started to work on a 2016, hamfest. Despite a late start that seriously hampered the ability to find open dates at available venues, Ev's team had been successful in planning for a date with the venue being Eastman Business Park, 200 West Ridge Road in Rochester.

The Rochester Hamfest site is located in the village of Hilton on Rt 259. This is a major north / south route and is accessible from the I-490, NY-531 expressways and the Lake Ontario State Parkway. See the map and list of directions.

From the NYS Thruway I-90 eastbound from Batavia.

Exit the Thruway at exit 47, continue straight out of the tollbooth on to I-490. Take I-490 north and east to the RT-259 exit. Turn left off of the exit driving north toward Hilton. Hilton Exempt Club is on the left.

From the NYS Thruway I-90 westbound from Canandaigua.

Exit the Thruway at exit 45, continue straight out of the tollbooth on to I-490. Take I-490 north and west through the city of Rochester. Exit 490 on to RT-531. Continue on RT-531 to the RT-259 exit. Turn right off of the exit driving north toward Hilton. Hilton Exempt Club is on the left.


From I-390 northbound from Avon.

Continue on I-390 north and west through the split with I-590. Exit I-390 at the I-490 intersection and go west on I-490. Exit I-490 on to RT-531. Continue on RT-531 to the RT-259 exit. Turn right off of the exit driving north toward Hilton. Hilton Exempt Club is on the left.

From Lake Ontario Parkway.

Turn south at the RT-259 exit. Proceed south through the village of Hilton. RT-259 make a left then right turn in the village. Hilton Exempt Club is on the right.
